If a governing board does not take appropriate action to designate representatives or this information is not given to Section offices within the required time frame, CIF is required to suspend voting privileges (CIF Constitution, Article 2, Section 25, p.16) for the affected schools.

At the State Federated Council level we will be asking that Sections verify that their representatives are designated in compliance with this Ed. Code section.

I hope this gives you a bit of background. Thank you for all you do to help support high school athletics. It is a valuable program in all high schools and we appreciate the support you give to the program and to CIF.

Approval of Special Education Local Plan Area, Local Educational Agency (LEA) Assurances

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The California Department of Education requires each SELPA to have on file policies and procedures that address twenty-nine federal assurances. When each local board approves the Assurances, the school district is assuring the state and federal government that it will comply with the policies developed at the local level. NCCSE's current Local Plan is being revised to align with changes in IDEA 2004. The attached Assurances must be approved by all LEA governing boards. On June 18, 2007, the SELPA Board of Governors will be asked to vote on the SELPA Local Plan which includes these Assurances. The Plan will then be submitted to the California Department of Education by June 30, 2007.

RECOMMENDATION

The San Dieguito Union High District Board of Trustees approve the attached Special Education Local Plan Area, Local Education Agency (LEA) Assurances.

AGENDA ITEM 13B

SPECIAL EDUCATION LOCAL PLAN AREA LOCAL EDUCATION AGENCY (LEA) ASSURANCES

1. FREE APPROPRIATE PUBLIC EDUCATION (20 USC § 1412 (a)(1))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that a free appropriate public education is available to all children residing in the LEA between the ages of three through 21 inclusive, including students with disabilities who have been suspended or expelled from school.

2. FULL EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITY (20 USC § 1412 (a)(2))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that all pupils with disabilities have access to educational programs, nonacademic programs, and services available to non-disabled pupils.

3. CHILD FIND (20 USC § 1412 (a)(3))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that all children with disabilities residing in the State, including children with disabilities who are homeless or are wards of the State and children attending private schools, regardless of the severity of their disabilities, and who are in need of special education and related services are identified, located and evaluated. A practical method is developed and implemented to determine which students with disabilities are currently receiving needed special education and related services.

4. INDIVIDUALIZED EDUCATION PROGRAM (IEP) AND INDIVIDUALIZED FAMILY SERVICE PLAN (IFSP) (20 USC § 1412 (a)(4))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that an Individualized Education Program (IEP) or an Individualized Family Service Plan (IFSP) is developed, reviewed and revised for each child with a disability who requires special education and related services in order to benefit from his/her individualized education program. It shall be the policy of this LEA that a review of an IEP will be conducted on at least an annual basis to review a student's progress and make appropriate revisions.

5. LEAST RESTRICTIVE ENVIRONMENT (20 USC § 1412 (a)(5))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that to the maximum extent appropriate, children with disabilities, including children in public or private institutions or other care facilities, are educated with children who are not disabled. Special class, separate schooling, or other removal of a student with disabilities from the general educational environment, occurs only when the nature or severity of the disability of the student is such that education in general classes with the use of supplemental aids and services cannot be achieved satisfactorily.

6. PROCEDURAL SAFEGUARDS (20 USC § 1412 (a)(6))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that children with disabilities and their parents shall be afforded all procedural safeguards throughout the provision of a free appropriate public education including the identification, evaluation, and placement process.

7. EVALUATION (20 USC § 1412 (a)(7))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that a reassessment of a student with a disability shall be conducted at least once every three years or more frequently, if appropriate.

8. CONFIDENTIALITY (20 USC § 1412 (a)(8))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that the confidentiality of personally identifiable data information and records maintained by the LEA relating to children with disabilities and their parents and families shall be protected pursuant to the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA).

9. PART C, TRANSITION (20 USC § 1412 (a)(9))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that a transition process for a child who is participating in Early Intervention Programs (IDEA, Part C) with an IFSP is begun prior to a toddler's third birthday. The transition process shall be smooth, timely and effective for the child and family.

10. PRIVATE SCHOOLS (20 USC § 1412 (a)(10))

It shall be the policy of this LEA to assure that children with disabilities voluntarily enrolled by their parents in private schools shall receive appropriate special education and related services pursuant to LEA coordinated procedures. The proportionate amount of federal funds will be allocated for the purpose of providing special education services to children with disabilities voluntarily enrolled in private school by their parents.

11. LOCAL COMPLIANCE ASSURANCES (20 USC § 1412 (a)(11))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that the local plan shall be adopted by the appropriate local board(s) (district/county) and is the basis for the operation and administration of special education programs; and that the agency(ies) herein represented will meet all applicable requirements of state and federal laws and regulations, including compliance with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, the Federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973, Section 504 of Public Law and the provisions of the California Education Code, Part 30.

12. INTERAGENCY (20 USC § 1412 (a)(12))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that interagency agreements or other mechanisms for interagency coordination are in effect to ensure services required for FAPE are provided, including the continuation of services during an interagency dispute resolution process.

13. GOVERNANCE (20 USC § 1412 (a)(13))

It shall be the policy of this LEA to support and comply with the provisions of the governance bodies and any necessary administrative support to implement the Local Plan. A final determination that an LEA is not eligible for assistance under this part will not be made without first affording that LEA with reasonable notice and an opportunity for a hearing through the State Educational Agency.

14. PERSONNEL QUALIFICATIONS (20 USC § 1412 (a)(14))

It shall be the policy of this LEA to ensure that personnel providing special education related services meet the highly qualified requirements as defined under federal law, including that those personnel have the content knowledge and skills to serve children with disabilities.

This policy shall not be construed to create a right of action on behalf of an individual student for the failure of a particular LEA staff person to be highly qualified or to prevent a parent from filing a State complaint with the CDE about staff qualifications.

15. PERFORMANCE GOALS & INDICATORS (20 USC § 1412 (a)(15))

It shall be the policy of this LEA to comply with the requirements of the performance goals and indicators developed by the CDE and provide data as required by the CDE.

16. PARTICIPATION IN ASSESSMENTS (20 USC § 1412 (a)(16))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that all students with disabilities shall participate in state and district-wide assessment programs. The IEP team determines how a student will access assessments with or without accommodations, or access alternate assessments, consistent with state standards governing such determinations.

17. SUPPLEMENTATION OF STATE/FEDERAL FUNDS (20 USC § 1412 (a)(17))

It shall be the policy of this LEA to provide assurances that funds received from Part B of the IDEA will be expended in accordance with the applicable provisions of the IDEA; will be used to supplement and not to supplant state, local and other Federal funds.

18. MAINTENANCE OF EFFORT (20 USC § 1412 (a)(18))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that federal funds will not be used to reduce the level of local funds and/or combined level of local and state funds expended for the education of children with disabilities except as provided in Federal law and regulations.

19. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION (20 USC § 1412 (a)(19))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that public hearings, adequate notice of the hearings, and an opportunity for comment available to the general public, including individuals with disabilities and parents of children with disabilities are held prior to the adoption of any policies and/or regulations needed to comply with Part B of the IDEA.

- **20. RULE OF CONSTRUCTION (20 USC § 1412 (a)(20))** (Federal requirement for State Education Agency only)
- 21. STATE ADVISORY PANEL (20 USC § 1412 (a)(21)) (Federal requirement for State Education Agency only)

22. SUSPENSION/EXPULSION (20 USC § 1412 (a)(22))

The LEA assures that data on suspension and expulsion rates will be provided in a manner prescribed by the CDE. When indicated by data analysis, the LEA further assures that policies, procedures and practices related to the development and implementation of the IEPs will be revised.

23. ACCESS TO INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS (20 USC § 1412 (a)(23))

It shall be the policy of this LEA to provide instructional materials to blind students or other students with print disabilities in a timely manner according to the state adopted National Instructional Materials Accessibility Standard.

24. OVERIDENTIFICATION AND DISPROPORTIONALITY (20 USC § 1412 (a)(24))

It shall be the policy of this LEA to prevent the inappropriate disproportionate representation by race and ethnicity of students with disabilities.

25. PROHIBITION ON MANDATORY MEDICINE (20 USC § 1412 (a)(25))

It shall be the policy of this LEA to prohibit school personnel from requiring a student to obtain a prescription for a substance covered by the Controlled Substances Act as a condition of attending school or receiving a special education assessment and/or services.

26. DISTRIBUTION OF FUNDS (20 USC § 1411(e),(f)(1-3) (Federal requirement for State Education Agency only)

27. DATA (20 USC § 1418 a-d)

It shall be the policy of this LEA to provide data or information to the California Department of Education that may be required by regulations.

28. READING LITERACY (State Board requirement, 2/99)

It shall be the policy of this LEA that in order to improve the educational results for students with disabilities, SELPA Local Plans shall include specific information to ensure that all students who require special education will participate in the California Reading Initiative.

29. CHARTER SCHOOLS (E.C. 56207.5 (a-c))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that a request by a charter school to participate as a local educational agency in a special education local plan area may not be treated differently from a similar request made by a school district.

CERTIFICATION OF BOARD MINUTES

This is to certify that in accordance with Federal and State laws and regulations, the **San Dieguito Union High School District**, at its regular meeting on **May 3**, **2007**, approved the local plan and that this plan is the basis for the operation and administration of special education programs. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The California Constitution and Education Code allow the Governing Board of public school districts to authorize a temporary transfer of funds from the County Treasurer, should cash flow needs arise.

San Dieguito Union High School District has been fortunate in the past number of years, to have adequate cash reserves either in the General Fund, or one of the special funds. General Fund budgets have been adopted in the past with line items transferring in up to Five Million Dollars. With dwindling cash reserves, a temporary transfer has been needed in October and/or November in order to meet the cash requirements to process payroll. Any borrowed amounts have been repaid to the originating fund as soon as local property tax income is received.

With construction projects coming to a close, special funds no longer have the cash reserves sometimes needed by the General Fund. Therefore, for the second year, it is suggested the Board adopt this resolution, which allows a temporary loan from the County Treasurer, in an amount not to exceed 85% of expected local property taxes.

Should a temporary transfer be needed, it is anticipated the amount would not exceed \$10,000,000, and would be repaid with current year property tax income, before June 30, 2008.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board approve the resolution authorizing a temporary transfer of funds.

If directed by the Board of Supervisors, funds will be transferred to this district by the Treasurer of the County of San Diego in sums as requested by the District Superintendent and certified by him/her to be necessary to provide funds for meeting the obligations incurred for maintenance purposes by the district not to exceed the maximum amount herein specified, provided the Treasurer determines that funds in his custody are available for such transfers.
- 3. The Clerk/Secretary of this Board is directed to file a copy of this resolution with the Board of Supervisors, the County Superintendent of Schools, the County Auditor and Controller, and the County Treasurer-Tax Collector.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Attached is the 2007-08 Career Technical Education Application for Funding. The San Dieguito Union High School District will use funds allocated from the Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education Improvement Act of 2006, section 131, to purchase two modular middle school technology labs. These labs will provide exploratory technology instruction, and are designed to interest middle school students in pursuing the Engineering program of study at the high school level. The labs are expected to be in place and operational at two middle school sites for the fall of 2007. The remainder of the funds will be used to allow release time for CTE teachers to participate in the district curriculum alignment project, and to partially fund a CTE/Perkins administrator salary.

The district utilizes the San Diego County ROP program for most capstone or completer levels within our CTE programs of study. This data gap does not allow the district to properly document several core indicators. Since the district utilizes the county ROP program for capstone or completer courses, we have secured the E-1 data from the county and are working with our district technology department to develop a parallel E-1 data analysis utilizing ROP student completer data. This project is in the beginning stages and will not be complete for this Perkins application. The ROP E-1 data of students by CBEDS codes is attached as an Appendix 6 with the Perkins IV transition plan.

- 2. Describe the actions being taken and/or planned by your agency to increase the level of performance in each core indicator not meeting the State established level. How are these proposed actions likely to result in performance level improvement?
 - 1. Core Indicator 1S2-Skill Attainment. (-7.51%) This is a ROP data issue that is explained above. We are in the process of hand counting ROP completers and developing a data system to do this electronically.
 - 2. Core Indicator 4S2-NonTrad. Completion. (00.0%) This is an ROP data issue that we are working to improve. Several major steps have been taken to increase nontraditional enrollment in the targeted program of study as well as district-wide:
 - a. Participation in an SB70 Engineering grant to increase levels of women and underrepresented populations in technology programs.
 - b. The development of a Health/Medical careers program of study at one site.
 - c. The development of site CTE recruitment materials with nontraditional career areas represented. (see Appendix 4)

CARL D. PERKINS CAREER & TECHNICAL EDUCATION IMPROVEMENT ACT OF 2006

Transition Plan for the Use of 2007-2008 Perkins 131 Funds

May 1, 2007

The San Dieguito Union High School District began planning for a series of CTE programs of study during the 2004-2005 school years. The intent of this effort was to implement career paths (programs of study) district wide and at our La Costa Canyon high school site in particular. This was the newest of the district's comprehensive high schools and was constructed at a time when career/vocational education programs were experiencing a statewide downturn. This school site had very few career options for its students and this limitation was recognized by most of the school's stakeholders. During the spring of 2006, the La Costa High School site team participated in the district Career Technology Education strategic planning session. During that session, the plan for making CTE an integrated part of the core curriculum was developed. During the 2007 meeting of the District Strategic Planning Initiative, the attached transition plan was developed by the site and the middle schools that feed La Costa Canyon High School (appendix 1).

The Engineering program of study started at the 2006-2007 school years with one course in CAD Drafting and one course in Engineering Principles. This program consists of both district and ROP funding sources and resulted in a dedicated lab with both computer workstations and business/industrial equipment for hands on projects. The advisory group (appendix 2) identified the need for a middle school component and a ninth grade component to complete the Engineering program of study. The middle school technology lab was the model most replicated at state schools and several commercial programs were evaluated. Additionally, the course, Introduction to Engineering Design was adopted for ninth grade high school students. The middle school technology labs will be in place and operational at two site middle schools for the fall of 2007.

Perkins Mandates Described

The following descriptions will outline the district plans to meet the Perkins IV mandates. Those mandates relate to the following issues: programs of study, accountability, and professional development.

Programs of Study

The stakeholders for CTE programs of study planning are delineated in appendix 2. These individuals serve as district CTE advisors and also as site advisors. The specific evaluation instrument for the past years activities is in appendix 3. Participants were asked to rate the level of achievement for the following issues:

- 1. District progress in providing early exploration of and exposure to varied career opportunities.
- 2. The extent to which we have systematically connected core academics to authentic application in industry, the professions, and occupational fields.
- 3. The effectiveness of district efforts to work with business and community partners to engage and motivate students to deepen their understanding of academic knowledge and skills.
- 4. The extent to which the district has developed a life-long vision of students' futures beyond their educational experiences.

Please review appendix 2 for a more detailed description of the above elements and a ranking of where the stakeholders felt the district was in terms of level of achievement for the targeted issues.

Once the district evaluation was completed, site teams of educators, parents, business partners were asked to complete a spot analysis of the issues that affect CTE at their site. The determination to apply Perkins funding to the Engineering program of study was an outcome of the combined spot analysis of two middle schools and their partner high school sites. The Engineering instructor, Debbie Elliott led the team through the complete Engineering program of study. This program begins at the feeder middle schools and terminates at the community college or university. The program at present has obtained A-G approval for the Introduction to Engineering Design and Principles of Engineering courses. The CAD Drafting and Principles of Engineering courses are articulated with the local community college, Mira Costa, and the program of study completers from this pathway have a guaranteed acceptance to the Cal State San Diego as Engineering major. Each course in the program of study is one year in duration. The courses in the program are as follows:

Introduction to Technology Introduction to Engineering	Middle School (grade 8)
Design	High School (grade 9)
CAD Drafting/Architectural- Civil	High School (made 10)
Principles of Engineering	High School (grade 10) High School (grade 10-11)
Engineering Design &

The program of study described above is designed to relate complex academic content in the areas of communications, mathematics and science to the actual design, construction and testing of engineering models and components. Students participate in demonstrations and competitions to develop soft skills such as leadership and career related presentation techniques.

The Engineering program will be continued as our 2008-2009 Perkins plan as we replicate the program of study at two middle schools and a high school site at the southern part of our district.

Accountability

The district has moved to a new student data system for this school year. District CTE staff and representatives from the district technology department have been meeting to insure the capture of the required accountability data. The actual data reports and delivery are completed utilizing an independent software contractor. This contractor has been utilized for the past five years and has delivered at a high performance level. The follow-up survey of prior year's twelfth grade completers utilizes three sources of data:

- 1. Senior exit surveys
- 2. College/University acceptance data
- 3. Telephone/mail-out surveys.

The state adjusted levels of performance are reviewed with the CTE advisory group and the district special population's directors/staff. The district scores well above the state performance levels in areas that we are able to measure. Since the district utilizes the ROP program as the capstone or completer level for most programs of study, we have secured the secondary E-1 data from our county ROP data and finance office (Appendix 6). This data is aggregated by CBEDS code and helps to form a complete vision of district student CTE performance. We are working with district personnel to develop a parallel E-1 type document for our ROP high school student completers. This is a large task however, and the data integration process is not complete.

Utilizing the district CTE program completer data and the ROP program completer data, we are able to determine where our improvement efforts should be targeted. This information was utilized by district planners to develop five new programs of study at one site in 2006-2007. For the 2007-2008 school years, we have brought a new high school site into the district and will utilize the performance data to develop programs of study at that location. As a part of the district strategic planning initiative, all sites are developing CTE advisory groups and parent/business data bases. Those groups will have access to the E-1/E-2 data for planning purposes.

Professional Development

The structure is now in place for CTE teams from each site in the district. These teams are represented by administrators, counselors, academic core teachers, CTE teachers, parents, business partners, and students (Appendix 1). Special populations are represented through select individuals that function in several roles (Example: English language/ Computer Applications teacher). Site teams are at differing levels of development at this time. Sites that are far along in the professional development area have at this time, surveyed students/parents and identified a plan for programs of study. One site has developed all of their career pathways and presented them in a large format brochure. (Appendix 4) A similar brochure will be developed at each of the sites.

The CTE teacher two year professional development goal is for all of the CTE courses to be aligned with CTE and Core academic standards. The first of the completed courses was the Auto Engine Performance course. District teachers began the alignment process with last year's presentation by the state consortium team on standards alignment. This three day training session was conducted at the San Diego County Office of Education and was attended by site teams of CTE and academic staff. The activity is a part of district and site in-service activities and will continue until the task is complete. There is a sample of the aligned Auto Engine Performance aligned course in Appendix 5. This is a combined district and site professional development effort. The district will continue to encourage teacher participation in work shops and conferences that improve teacher technical skills. A high priority is given to those developmental activities that result in student certification at business/industry levels.

The professional development goals for the district are as follows:

- 1. Provide activities that result in on-going communication improvements
- 2. Develop site CTE leadership with the help of district support
- 3. Develop processes to integrate CTE with core subjects
- 4. Expand partnerships with all stakeholders

These goals will form the basis for all of out site and district CTE professional development activities.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

State law requires that school-level plans for programs funded through the new SB1802 Discretionary Block Grant be approved by the Board of Trustees, after development by school Site Councils. The content of each school plan includes school goals, activities and expenditures for improving the academic performance of students to the proficient level and above. This new additional funding will be used to support current plans. Refer to the attached backup materials for spending highlights. Each site receives \$42 per student with this one-time funding. The total amount our school sites will receive is \$552,252. The district will receive an additional \$185,266 to support underachieving students. The money must be spent by June, 2008.

This Discretionary Block Grant is funded through the Consolidated Application. The Consolidated Application is the fiscal mechanism used by the California Department of Education to distribute categorical funds from various state and federal programs to county offices, school districts and charter schools throughout California.

RECOMMENDATION:

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The City of Encinitas is proposing to install off site improvements to provide sidewalk, curbs and gutters on both sides of Bonita Drive adjacent to San Dieguito Academy. This will improve pedestrian access and underground the open storm drain. In order to provide the improvements, the City of Encinitas and San Diego Gas & Electric require the District to grant easements.

Specifically, the City of Encinitas requires an easement of 16' wide starting at the corner of Bonita Road and Santa Fe Road, north and along Bonita Road, reducing to 10' wide, and ending at the corner of Bonita Road and Melba Road (Exhibit B to the Drainage and Pedestrian Access Easement). In conjunction with the City of Encinitas, San Diego Gas & Electric will relocate a utility pole and install new anchors which will require a separate easement (Exhibit A to Easement – SDG&E).

The adoption of the Resolution of Intention to Dedicate Interest in Real Property is the first step in granting an easement. The final steps will require a public hearing and adoption of a Resolution Dedicating an Interest in Real Property at the May 17, 2007 board meeting.







EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Alternative schools that are explicitly defined in the *Ed Code* as serving high-risk students are automatically eligible to apply to participate in the Alternative School Accountability Model (ASAM). The ASAM model emphasizes three central concepts:

Student and school performance measures are based upon multiple indicators that assess a school's ability to serve high-risk students. The indicators measure change in learning readiness, engagement, and educational goal attainment as well as academic achievement and cognitive growth.

Schools choose, from a variety of indicators, those most appropriate to their goals and student populations.

An ASAM school's performance will not be compared with that of other schools but rather with its own performance over time.

Furthermore, the ASAM provides school-level supplemental accountability for schools who do not receive No Child Left Behind (NCLB) Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) determinations or valid Academic Performance Index (API) scores, primarily because of high rates of student mobility. Sunset High School already operates under the ASAM model. North Coast Alternative School would benefit from the ASAM too.

It is recommended that the Board approve the application for ASAM status for North Coast Alternative School.

PROPOSED 0420

SCHOOL PLANS/SITE COUNCILS

The Board of Trustees encourages district employees, students, parents/guardians and other members of the school community to develop school plans designed to meet the specific needs at individual school sites. The Board may approve or disapprove school plans as necessary in order to fulfill the district's mission, accomplish the Board's adopted goals and/or comply with legal requirements.

When submitting a consolidated application for state and federal categorical programs to the California Department of Education, the superintendent or designee shall assure that a single plan for student achievement has been prepared for each participating school in accordance with law. (Education Code 64001)

The superintendent or designee shall ensure that schools desiring to participate in categorical programs establish and maintain a school site council. Such councils shall be responsible for the development, review and modification of school plans and for other duties as prescribed by law.

When required by law or determined to be a useful tool to accomplish district and school goals, school site councils or other school advisory groups shall develop comprehensive school plans designed to enhance student achievement at individual school sites.

Single Plan for Student Achievement

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that a single plan for student achievement is prepared by the school site council as required by law for each school participating in specified state and/or federal categorical programs. (Education Code 41507, 41572, 52055.755, 64001)

Whenever feasible, any other school plan may be incorporated into the single plan for student achievement.

The Superintendent or designee shall review each school's single

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plan and ensure that it has been developed and approved by a properly constituted school site council, meets the content requirements for all programs included, is based on an analysis of current practices and student academic performance, and reasonably links improvement strategies to identified needs of the school and students. He/she shall submit to the Governing Board his/her recommendations for plan approval or recommendations regarding any subsequent material revision of the plan.

The Board shall review and approve each school's single plan for student achievement at a regularly scheduled meeting. The Board also shall review and approve any subsequent revisions that include material changes affecting the academic programs for students participating in these categorical programs. The Board shall certify that, to the extent allowable under federal law, the plan is consistent with district local improvement plans required as a condition of receiving federal funding. (Education Code 64001)

School Site Block Grants

Upon receipt of state funding for school site block grants, the Board shall allocate the funds to district schools on an equal perpupil basis. (AB 1802, Sec. 43, Statutes of 2006)

The school's use of the funds allocated through this block grant shall be proposed by the school site council or, if the school does not have a school site council, by a school-wide advisory group or school support group. (AB 1802, Sec. 43, Statutes of 2006)

The Board encourages school site councils to fund the highest priority needs identified in school improvement plans. The school site council shall provide the Superintendent or designee and the Board with a written proposal that includes a statement of the identified need(s) and how the funds will be used to enhance the educational program.

Before the funds are encumbered or expended, the Board shall approve the site council's proposed use of the funds. If the Board

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does not approve the proposed use, the Board shall inform the school site council of the reasons for disapproval and request that the council review and revise its proposal. (AB 1802, Sec. 43, Statutes of 2006)

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SCHOOL PLANS/SITE COUNCILS

School Site Councils

When required for participation in any categorical program, each district school shall establish a school site council or advisory committee. (Education Code 41507, 41572, 52852, 64001)

The school site council shall be composed of the following: (Education Code 41507, 41572, 52852)

- 1. The principal
- 2. Teachers selected by the school's teachers
- Other school personnel chosen by the school's other personnel
- Parents/guardians of students attending the school chosen by other such parents/guardians, or community members chosen by the parents/guardians as representatives
- 5. In secondary schools, students attending the school chosen by other such students

Half of the school site council membership shall consist of school staff, the majority of whom shall be classroom teachers, the remaining half shall be equal numbers of parents/guardians or parent/guardian representatives) and students. (Education Code 41507, 41572, 52852)

A district employee may serve as a parent/guardian representative on the site council of the school his/her child attends, provided the employee does not work at that school. (Education Code 52852)

School site councils may function on behalf of other committees in accordance with law. (Education Code 52055.620, 52176, 52870, 54425; 5 CCR 3932)

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School site councils shall operate in accordance with procedural meeting requirements established in Education Code 35147. Single Plan for Student Achievement

In order for a school to participate in any state or federal categorical program specified in Education Code 41506, 41571, 52055.700, or 64000, the school site council shall approve, annually review, and update a single plan for student achievement. If the school does not have a school site council, a school-wide advisory group or school support group conforming to the composition requirements of the school site council listed above shall fulfill these responsibilities. (Education Code 41507, 41572, 52055.755, 64001)

The single plan for student achievement shall be aligned with school goals for improving student achievement and shall be based on an analysis of verifiable state data, including the Academic Performance Index (API) and the California English Language Development Test (CELDT), and any other data voluntarily developed by the district to measure student achievement. (Education Code 64001)

The plan shall, at a minimum: (Education Code 64001)

- 1. Address how funds provided to the school through categorical programs will be used to improve the academic performance of all students to the level of the performance goals established by the API
- 2. Identify the school's means of evaluating progress toward accomplishing those goals
- 3. Identify how state and federal law governing these programs will be implemented

In addition to meeting the requirements common to all applicable school plans, the single plan shall address the content required by law for each individual categorical program in which the school participates.

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PROPOSED PHILOSOPHY-GOALS-OBJECTIVES AND COMPREHENSIVE PLANS 0420/AR-1 Plans developed for the state's Immediate Intervention/Underperforming Schools Program pursuant to Education Code 52054 or the federal Title I school-wide programs pursuant to 20 USC 6314 shall satisfy the requirement for the single plan. (Education Code 64001) In developing or revising the single plan, the school site council shall:

1. Measure the effectiveness of current improvement strategies at the school

The school site council shall analyze student performance based on state and local data, identify significant low performance among all student groups, and analyze instructional programs to determine program areas that need to be addressed in order to raise performance of student groups not meeting academic standards.

- 2. Seek input from other school advisory committees as appropriate
- 3. Reaffirm or revise school goals to serve as a basis for school improvement activities and expenditures
- 4. Revise improvement strategies and expenditures

The school site council shall specify actions to be taken, dates by which actions are to be started and completed, expenditures needed to implement the action, the funding source, anticipated annual performance growth for each student group, and the means that will be used to evaluate progress toward each goal.

5. Approve and recommend the plan to the Governing Board

The Superintendent or designee and the principal shall implement the strategies in the single plan and report to the school site council and the Board regarding progress toward school goals. The school site council shall monitor the implementation and effectiveness of the single plan and modify any activities that prove ineffective.

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School Plans for Categorical Block Grants

Whenever a school participates in the state's categorical block grant programs for student retention and/or school and library improvement, the school site council shall develop a plan which shall include, but need not be limited to: (Education Code 41507, 41572)

- Curricula, instructional strategies, and materials responsive to the individual educational needs and learning styles of each student that enables all students to do all of the following:
 - a. Make continuous progress and learn at a rate appropriate to their abilities
 - Master basic skills in language development and reading, writing, and mathematics
 - c. Develop knowledge and skills in other aspects of the curricula, such as arts and humanities; physical, natural, and social sciences; multicultural education; physical, emotional, and mental health; consumer economics; and career education
 - Pursue educational interests and develop esteem for self and others; personal and social responsibility, critical thinking, and independent judgment
- 2. Consideration of the use of community resources to achieve instructional improvement objectives
- 3. Consideration of the use of education technology
- 4. A staff development program for teachers, other school personnel, paraprofessionals, and volunteers
- 5. Provisions for utilization of the student success team process to identify and assess the needs of students who are dropouts or potential dropouts, and to develop programs to meet those needs
- 6. Procedures for coordinating services from funding sources at the school level to help students participate successfully

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PHILOSOPHY-GOALS-OBJECTIVES AND COMPREHENSIVE PLANS 0420/AR-1 in the core academic curricula and specialized curricula related to jobs and career opportunities

- 7. Instructional and auxiliary services to meet the special needs of students who are limited-English-speaking, including instruction in a language they understand; educationally disadvantaged students; gifted and talented students; and students with disabilities
- 8. Improvement of the classroom and school environments, including improvement of relationships between and among students, school personnel, parents/guardians, and the community, and reduction of the incidence of violence and vandalism among students
- 9. Improvement of student attendance, including parent/guardian awareness of the importance of regular school attendance
- 10. The proposed expenditure of block grant funds and the degree to which expenditures meet the plan's criteria
- 11. Other activities and objectives established by the school site council
- 12. A process for ongoing evaluation and modification of the plan

The evaluation shall be based on the degree to which the school is meeting the plan's objectives, student achievement, and improved school environment. An improved school environment shall be measured by indicators such as the incidence of absenteeism, suspension and expulsion, dropouts, school violence, vandalism and theft; student attitudes towards the school, self, and others; absenteeism among staff, staff resignations and requests for transfers; and satisfaction of students, parents/guardians, teachers, administrators, and staff.

In addition, any school receiving state funding for school and library improvement shall incorporate plans pertaining to school libraries. (Education Code 41572) The student retention and/or school and library improvement plans shall be incorporated into the school's single plan for student

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PROPOSED PHILOSOPHY-GOALS-OBJECTIVES AND COMPREHENSIVE PLANS 0420/AR-1 achievement as described in the above section. (Education Code 41507, 41572)

School Site Block Grants

The school site council may propose any one-time educational purpose for the use of funds allocated to school sites under school site block grants, including, but not limited to, the following purposes: (AB 1802, Sec. 43, Statutes of 2006)

- 1. Instructional materials
- 2. Classroom and laboratory supplies and materials
- 3. School and classroom library materials
- 4. Educational technology
- 5. Deferred maintenance
- 6. Expenditures designed to close the achievement gap
- 7. Professional development

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SCHOOL PLANS/SITE COUNCILS

The following guidelines shall apply to the establishment of School Site Councils in the San Dieguito Union High School District.

I. <u>MEMBERSHIP</u>

The School Site Council shall consist of a maximum of 20 members at the high school level and 12 members at the middle school level. The membership shall include:

- A. The School Site Council shall be constituted to ensure parity between (a) the principal, classroom teachers and other school personnel, and (b) an equal number of parents and students.
- B. Classroom teachers shall constitute a majority of section A, subsection (a) above.
- C. Representatives of each category shall be selected by their peers in that group through a democratic process identified in the bylaws of each School Site Council.
- D. A school employee may serve as a parent/guardian representative on the site council of the school his/her child attends, provided the employee does not work at that school.
- E. The School Site Council, parent and student membership should be representative of the geographic, ethnic and socio-economic composition of the community served.
- F. The school principal or designee shall be present at each meeting of the School Site Council.
- G. Members of the School Site Council shall agree to represent the special interests of <u>all</u> students including, but not limited to the special needs of non-English speaking or limited-English speaking pupils; educationally disadvantaged pupils; gifted and talented pupils; and pupils with exceptional needs.

II. OPERATIONAL PROCEDURES

A. School Site Councils shall elect a chairperson and a secretary along with any other officer required by the bylaws of the group.

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- B. The term of office shall be one year. No officer shall serve more than two terms.
- C. Roberts Rules of Order will govern the conduct of meetings.
- D. All meetings will be held at the appropriate school or district site.
- E. The number of meetings to be held will be determined by the group.
- F. The School Site Council will follow provisions of the Ralph M. Brown Anti-Secret Meeting Act which requires (a) at least twenty-four hours notice of all meetings, and (b) all meetings will be open to the public.
- G. Minutes of meetings will be kept and shall be available to the public.

III. <u>SINGLE PLAN FOR STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT</u>

In order for a school to participate in state and federal categorical programs funded through the state's consolidated application process, the school site council shall consolidate and approve a single plan for student achievement. This plan shall be aligned with school goals for improving student achievement and shall be based on an analysis of verifiable state data, including the Academic Performance Index and the English Language Development Test, and any other data voluntarily developed by the district to measure student achievement. (Education Code 64001)

The plan shall, at a minimum: (Education Code 64001)

- 1. Address how funds provided to the school through any of the programs identified in Education Code 64000 will be used to improve the academic performance of all students to the level of the performance goals established by the Academic Performance Index
- 2. Identify the school's means of evaluating progress toward accomplishing those goals
- 3. Identify how state and federal law governing these programs

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will be implemented

Whenever feasible, the school site council may include within the above plan any plans required by other categorical programs.

The school site council shall annually review and update this plan, including the proposed expenditure of funds allocated to the school for these programs. If the school does not have a school site council, a school wide advisory group or school support group, conforming to the requirements of Education Code 52012, shall fulfill these responsibilities. (Education Code 64001)

The Governing Board shall review and approve the plan at a regularly scheduled meeting. The Board also shall review and approve any subsequent revisions that include material changes affecting the academic programs for students participating in these programs. The Board shall certify that, to the extent allowable under federal law, the plan is consistent with district local improvement plans required as a condition of receiving federal funding. (Education Code 64001)

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY			

This item is on the Agenda for Final Reading and Adoption, and was first on the Board's agenda of May 3, 2007.

During the past 15 months the District has completed about 75% implementation of the new Student Information System (SIS), trade name Eagle Aeries. It is proving itself to be an invaluable tool for managing student information and will soon have the capability of allowing parents to access information about their children while they are enrolled in our schools.

Initially one position was added to the Technology Department to carry out implementation and provide training to staff. The District has determined that one additional position is required to assist in completing the implementation and to support the ongoing staff training and data maintenance for this comprehensive, complex, and essential student information system.

A draft job description for the proposed Information Systems Support Technician is attached for review and information. The recommendation to allocate the class at Salary Range 44 is based on internal relationships of the existing classification plan. This recommendation was reviewed by the Personnel Commission at its regular meeting on April 10, 2007. CSEA has been apprised of the recommendations for this position.

INFORMATION SYSTEMS SUPPORT TECHNICIAN

OVERALL JOB PURPOSE STATEMENT:

Under the direction of the Director of Educational Technology, the job of Information Systems Support Technician includes supporting ongoing activities and maintenance of the student information system (SIS) and other district resource application systems as assigned; providing technical training to site personnel who use SIS; resolving reports and data issues of SIS; maintaining SIS software and reporting capability.

DISTINGUISHING CHARACTERISTICS

Positions in the technology program are responsible for the installation, maintenance, repair and reliable functioning of hardware, software, and data systems acquired and installed to support District instructional and administrative programs.

The Information Systems Support Technician is responsible to support procedures and activities established to maintain the reliability and integrity of the student information system (SIS) including attendance, registration, class scheduling, grades, and other application systems as assigned and for assisting with the SIS Help Desk. In contrast, the Information Systems Support Specialist is responsible for the integrity of the data maintained in the District's student information system, for the reliability of the software that supports the system, for ensuring necessary training for all SIS uses, and for coordinating activities of the SIS Help Desk.

ESSENTIAL FUNCTIONS

- * Supports the program to develop and maintain a district-level database for the purpose of collecting, organizing, analyzing and reporting student test results required by the District and by county, state and federal agencies.
- * Manages and maintains daily tasks for SIS data and reports for the purpose of ensuring reliability and accuracy of the database.

INFORMATION SYSTEMS SUPPORT TECHNICIAN

- * Designs various reports and report formats for the purpose of providing information to meet specific reporting needs.
- * Provides training to site personnel on use of student information system for ensuring the accurate, timely and integral use of the program at all school sites.
- * Analyzes student information using application software for the purpose of providing District programs with information needed to make various program decisions.
- * Provides technical support and training to site users and District system users to ensure that SIS functions normally and reliably and staff are able to make full use of SIS capabilities.
- * As assigned may prepare files for electronic transmission of data to various State and education agencies for the purpose of meeting various reporting requirements and requests for information.
- * Assists in the development of District procedures and SIS protocols for the purpose of ensuring a uniform and reliable data environment and maintaining documentation of installed systems.
- * Assists in the support of systems and projects as directed for the purpose of maintaining integrity of SIS and meeting the information needs of system users.
- * As assigned supports importation of student data such as scores, grading, registration, attendance, etc., from various sources (for example, elementary districts, site records, etc.) to ensure accurate and timely posting of essential new data.
- * Designs/produces materials (e.g. brochures, forms, training aids, etc.) for the purpose of communicating information.
- * Organizes records and files for the purpose of establishing and maintaining a system of access to information.

INFORMATION SYSTEMS SUPPORT TECHNICIAN

- * Compiles data of a statistical nature (e.g. projections, data fields and records, student demographics, etc.) for the purpose of assisting others in the preparation of recommendations and/or reports for administrative review and action.
- * Informs public and outside agencies regarding a variety of procedures and program requirements for the purpose of providing the necessary information for completing transactions, taking appropriate actions and/or complying with established guidelines.
- * Prepares/composes/disseminates a variety of documents (e.g. correspondence, agendas, minutes of meetings, lists, reports, calendars, schedules, flyers, charts, etc.) for the purpose of documenting and communicating activities and information.

OTHER FUNCTIONS

* Performs other related duties as assigned.

JOB REQUIREMENTS: Minimum Qualifications

Skills, Knowledge and Abilities

KNOWLEDGE OF Windows operating system environment; procedures to maintain complex database and reporting systems; industry standards and procedures of SIS database application and maintenance, student attendance, grading, registration, and class scheduling standards, practices, and procedures; modern office practices, procedures and equipment; design and format of reports extracted from database systems; troubleshooting and diagnostic techniques for identifying and resolving database and basic principles of training; reporting errors; software District; applications used by the oral and written communication skills; telephone techniques and etiquette; English usage, grammar, spelling, punctuation and correct vocabulary; interpersonal skills using tact, patience and courtesy; principles of providing work direction and quidance.

ABILITY TO communicate and work effectively with others, including variety staff, students, а of managers and administrators; understand written and oral instructions; organize and plan an effective work schedule with users; install maintain complex database systems and applications; and debut database applications troubleshoot and and software problems; train and assist others in the use and functions of assigned software; provide and maintain documentation of installed systems; work under general supervision on software problems; communicate with vendors and other technical experts to diagnose and eliminate software problems; work with accuracy and precise attention to details and provide similar guidance to system end-users; provide technical support and quidance and procedures, techniques, methods, training on system and requirements to others; read, interpret and apply technical manuals and documentation; detect errors in data output; analyze situations accurately and adopt an effective course of action; meet schedules and timelines; observe legal and defensive driving practices; travel between district sites and to other work-related locations such as the San Diego County Office of Education.

Working Environment

The usual and customary methods of performing the job's functions generally require 75% sitting, 10% walking and 15% standing. The job is performed in typical office and school site environments. OVERALL JOB PURPOSE STATEMENT:

Under the direction of the Director of Educational Technology, the job of Media Technician/Web Technician is done for the purposes of operating and maintaining a variety of digital and analog equipment (e.g. Dynacom; Safari; video control servers etc.); updating and maintaining the District's web site department related web pages; providing technical guidance and assistance to faculty and staff; and performing skilled electronics and mechanical installation, repair and maintenance of equipment and related electronic systems.

DISTINGUISHING CHARACTERISTICS

Technician Technician/Web The Media supports functions associated with site multi-media activities, including systems such as Safari, Dynacom, montage, video control server, and other specialized equipment, and with technical tasks to update and maintain the District's web site and related web pages. The class differs from Computer Support Technician is which responsible for the installation, maintenance, and repair of computer hardware, software and networks for both Intel-based and Macintosh-based installed technology and requires knowledge of operating tools and advanced electronic hardware and software analysis equipment for diagnosing, repairing and resolving computer hardware and software problems on individual workstations and peripheral equipment as well as network systems.

ESSENTIAL FUNCTIONS

- * Performs a variety of technical duties (*e.g.* create, edit, integrate graphics, text, video; convert files between various formats; etc.) for the purpose of updating and maintaining the District web site and related web pages.
- * Coordinates with vendor as assigned, and with input from district departments, determination of proper artistic and visual layout for web site and pages for the purpose of ensuring conformance to applicable District standards, maintaining a cohesive and quality appearance, effective design, and ease of access to web site information and links.

- * Participates in the testing and debugging of the District web site, pages and related applications to assure proper functioning and resolution of server and web page malfunctions.
- * Coordinate resources (including outside consultant) on largescale projects to redesign and overhaul the web site for the purpose of ensuring District intentions for web site are implemented and installed in a timely matter and in accordance with specifications.
- * Assesses diagnoses and determines most efficient and cost effective modes for repair and maintenance of assigned multimedia equipment for the purpose of resolving problems and maintaining equipment in conformance with district contracts and within budget.
- * Installs/monitors/maintains a multi-channel closed-circuit television system (CCTV), color TV studio and editing systems for the purpose of ensuring the availability of equipment as needed.
- * Performs a variety of responsible technical duties in the scheduling, operation and distribution of technologically advanced audio/visual, TV, and/or computer-based equipment and materials for the purpose of ensuring the effectiveness of media programs and services.
- * Confers with administrators, faculty, staff and students for the purpose of providing technical expertise and information, planning and scheduling equipment use, and providing technical advice as needed in the selection and operation of all media equipment.
- * Maintains current knowledge of trends and developments in technical equipment for the purpose of making recommendations and preparing requisitions regarding audio/visual, TV, multi-media equipment and related software as directed.
- * Recommends selection and procurement of items upon collection of vendor bids for audio/visual, multi-media or other electronic equipment, videos and related materials for the purpose of maintaining AV and other systems at appropriate levels.

- * Communicates with school and district personnel, vendors, outside organizations and agencies for the purpose of coordinating work activities and to provide and receive technical information and services as required.
- * Coordinates the collection of technical information for use by the Purchasing Department in relation to solicitations for bid proposals to construct, maintain and/or repair fiber optic and other components of closed circuit television system.
- * Coordinates closely with the District Technology Department and with system vendors on new installation and on repair of proprietary fiber optics and television components. installation Coordinates repair and schedules with subcontractors involved with repair and new construction projects.
- * Establishes a system of preventive maintenance of media equipment for the purpose of ensuring that equipment is in proper working condition.
- * Performs minor maintenance and adjustments on assigned equipment for the purpose of maintaining equipment in proper working condition and/or arranging for repair of damaged or malfunctioning equipment.

OTHER FUNCTIONS

* Performs other related duties as assigned.

JOB REQUIREMENTS: Minimum Qualifications

Skills, Knowledge and Abilities

SKILLS are required to perform multiple, technical tasks with a need to occasionally upgrade skills in order to meet changing job conditions. Specific skills required to satisfactorily perform the functions of the job include: operating a variety of office and media equipment including, typewriters, calculators, copiers, microfiche reader/printer, audio-visual equipment, closed circuit broadcast and recording equipment; analyzing and designing web systems, applications, sites and files; converting various file format including but not limited to word processing, spreadsheet, PowerPoint, Front Page, Adobe PDF, HTML

and their future versions and replacements; designing effective web sites and web pages.

KNOWLEDGE is required to read technical information, compose a variety of documents, and/or facilitate group discussions; and analyze situations to define issues and draw conclusions. Specific knowledge required to satisfactorily perform the job functions of the include: operating and performing maintenance on sophisticated and technologically advanced audio/visual, TV (excluding ΤV tubes) and Media Center equipment; audio/visual and TV production techniques; rules and regulations of the Federal Communications Commission concerning copyright laws; operation and maintenance of specialized and technologically advanced audio/visual, TV, and digital media equipment and materials; graphics production and television recording techniques; related electronic circuits and electrical wiring; design and functionality of links, online forms, surveys and script; principles and techniques of web site and web page design and repair; record keeping techniques; principles and practices of supervision and training; technical aspects of field of specialty; oral written communication skills; scheduling, circulation and distribution of education media materials; methods, techniques, tools and equipment used in the repair, servicing and cleaning of audio/visual equipment; cable and audio systems; interpersonal skills using tact, patience and courtesy; safety regulations; various computer hardware and software programs.

ABILITY is required to schedule activities; qather and/or collate data; and consider a variety of factors when using equipment. Flexibility is required to independently work with others in a wide variety of circumstances; to work with data utilizing defined but different processes; and to utilize equipment under a variety of conditions for multiple purposes. Ability is also required to work with a diversity of individuals and/or groups; work with a variety of data; and utilize a variety of types of job-related equipment. In working with others, independent problem solving is required to analyze issues and create action plans. Problem solving with data requires independent interpretation of guidelines; and problem solving with equipment is moderate to significant. Specific abilities required to satisfactorily perform the functions of the job include: training and supervising students and staff in the use and applications of audio/visual, TV, computer software

and other media equipment and materials; providing technical editing expertise assistance, and advice to others; communicating effectively both orally and in writing; maintaining records and preparing reports; establishing and maintaining cooperative and effective working relationships with others; evaluating equipment repair needs; planning and organizing equipment repair, inventory and cost control techniques; analyzing situations accurately and adopting an effective course of action; and working independently; apply principles and techniques of web site and web page design and programming; determine proper artistic and visual layout for web site and pages; evaluate requests for web site additions, solutions and revisions; design and assure functionality of links, online forms; surveys and scripts; prepare, review, proofread, and edit website script and copy; meet schedules and timelines.

Responsibility

Responsibilities include: working under limited supervision following standardized practices and/or methods; providing information and/or advising others; and operating within a defined budget. Utilization of some resources from other work units may be required to perform the job's functions. There is a continual opportunity to impact the organization's services.

Working Environment

The usual and customary methods of performing the job's functions require the following physical demands: occasional lifting, carrying, pushing, and/or pulling; some climbing and balancing; significant stooping, kneeling, crouching, and/or crawling; and significant fine finger dexterity. Generally the job requires 60% sitting, 20% walking and 20% standing. The job is performed under minimal temperature variations, some hazardous conditions, and in a clean atmosphere. Employee is required to drive to sites throughout district frequently; such travel is typically in employee's own vehicle with mileage reimbursement.

PROPOSED PHILOSOPHY-GOALS-OBJECTIVES AND COMPREHENSIVE PLANS 0430

COMPREHENSIVE LOCAL PLAN FOR SPECIAL EDUCATION

The Governing Board desires to provide a high-quality education for all students, including those with disabilities. The Board recognizes that all individuals with disabilities have the right to receive a free and appropriate public education.

The district shall provide special education instruction and services for individuals with exceptional needs in accordance with the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act.

Modifications and/or special services and aids shall also be provided as needed for students who are eligible for services under Section 504 of the federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973, the Americans with Disabilities Act and related federal regulations.

In order to meet the needs of individuals with disabilities and employ staff with adequate expertise for this purpose, the district participates as a member of the North Coast Consortium for Special Education (NCCSE) in a Special Education Local Plan Area (SELPA).

The Superintendent or designee shall extend the district's full cooperation to NCCSE. The policies and procedures of NCCSE shall be applied as policies and regulations of this district, with the exception of those that apply to complaints, unless the local plan specifically authorizes the district to operate under its own policies and regulations.

In accordance with selection procedures described in the NCCSE plan, the Board shall appoint district representatives to the NCCSE community advisory committee. This committee shall make suggestions for the development, amendment and review of the local plan, recommend annual priorities, promote parent/guardian and community involvement, assist in parent/guardian education, and support activities on behalf of individuals with exceptional needs. (Education Code 56190-56194)

PHILOSOPHY-GOALS-OBJECTIVES AND COMPREHENSIVE PLANS 0430

COMPREHENSIVE LOCAL PLAN FOR SPECIAL EDUCATION

The Governing Board desires to provide a high-quality education for all students, including those with disabilities. The Board recognizes that all individuals with disabilities have the right to receive a free and appropriate public education.

The district shall provide special education instruction and services for individuals with exceptional needs in accordance with the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act.

Modifications and/or special services and aids shall also be provided as needed for students who are eligible for services under Section 504 of the federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973, the Americans with Disabilities Act and related federal regulations.

In order to meet the needs of individuals with disabilities and employ staff with adequate expertise for this purpose, the district participates as a member of the North Coast Consortium for Special Education in a Special Education Local Plan Area (SELPA).

The Superintendent or designee shall extend the district's full cooperation to NCCSE. The policies and procedures of NCCSE shall be applied as policies and regulations of this district, with the exception of those that apply to complaints, unless the local plan specifically authorizes the district to operate under its own policies and regulations.

In accordance with selection procedures described in the NCCSE plan, the Board shall appoint district representatives to the NCCSE community advisory committee. This committee shall make suggestions for the development, amendment and review of the local plan, recommend annual priorities, promote parent/guardian and community involvement, assist in parent/guardian education, and support activities on behalf of individuals with exceptional needs. (Education Code 56190-56194)

COMPREHENSIVE LOCAL PLAN FOR SPECIAL EDUCATION

Definitions

Free appropriate public education (FAPE) means special education and related services that are provided at public expense, under public supervision and direction, and without charge; meet the standards of the California Department of Education, including the requirements of 34 CFR 300.1-300.818; include appropriate preschool, elementary school, or secondary school education for children between the ages of 3 and 21; and are provided in conformity with the student's individualized education program (IEP) that meets the requirement of 34 CFR 300.320-300.324. (34 CFR 300.17, 300.101, 300.104)

The right to FAPE extends to students who are suspended or expelled or placed by the district in a nonpublic, nonsectarian school. (34 CFR 300.17, 300.101, 300.104)

Least restrictive environment means that, to the maximum extent appropriate, students with disabilities, including children in public or private institutions or other care facilities, be educated with children who are non-disabled, including the provision of non-academic and extra-curricular services and activities. (34 CFR 300.107, 300.114, 300.117)

Special education means specially designed instruction, provided at no cost to the parent/guardian, to meet the unique needs of individuals with disabilities whose educational needs cannot be met with modification of the regular instruction program. It also includes related services, provided at no cost to the parent/guardian, which may be needed to assist these individuals to benefit from specially designed instruction. Special education provides a full continuum of program options, including instruction conducted in the classroom, in the home, in hospitals and institutions, and in other settings; and instruction in physical education, to meet the educational and service needs of individuals with disabilities in the least restrictive environment. (Education Code 56031)

Specially designed instruction means adapting, as appropriate to the needs of an eligible student, the content, methodology, or delivery of instruction to address the unique needs of the student that result from the student's disability and to ensure access of the student to the general curriculum, so that the student can meet the educational standards within the district that apply to all students. (34 CFR 300.39)

Surrogate parent means an individual assigned to act as a surrogate for the parent/guardian. The surrogate may represent an individual with disabilities in matters relating to identification, assessment, instructional planning and development, educational placement, reviewing and revising the IEP, and in other matters relating to the provision of FAPE to the individual with disability. (34 CFR 300.519; Education Code 56050)

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Board approved the 2007-08 Instructional Calendar on May 4, 2005 and again May 3, 2006 with revisions. Since that time, staff has reviewed the quarter/semester/term ending dates at the two Academy's and are recommending that the January Staff Inservice days be moved to January 28 and 29, 2008 and the quarter/semester/term ending dates be designated as October 30, 2007, January 25, April 4, 2008 in order to distribute more equally the number of days in each quarter for instructional purposes.

Two versions of the calendar are being presented to the Board. The first, Version 1, includes September 14, 2007 as a certificated non-work day resulting in the last day of school to be Friday, June 13, 2008. Version 2 excludes the certificated non-work day which ends the school year on Thursday, June 12, 2008.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Every seven years, major academic departments are given an opportunity to adopt new textbooks. This is the year of the Science adoption.

The Science adoption process began in August under the leadership of the Science Department Coordinator, Kevin Fairchild. All science teachers were given an opportunity to participate in the review process. Mr. Fairchild shared the process and progress with the Parent Curriculum Advisory Committee, which was also given an opportunity to review the texts. In March, a community "Textbook Preview Night" was held. The entire community was invited to attend to review the books and provide feedback. Publishers of textbooks and programs under consideration were present to answer questions from community members.

After the Science department reached agreement, Mr. Fairchild met again with the Parent Curriculum Advisory Committee and discussed and shared the department's recommendations.

On March 21, 2007, Mr. Fairchild presented the department recommendation to the District Coordinating Council. Council members had an opportunity to review the texts. The Coordinating Council approved the selection and recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the materials for adoption.

SPECIAL FUNDS - OVERVIEW

Information relative to special funds, other than the General Fund, gives a brief description of the activities of the fund, specific projects, and financial trends.

Adult Education Fund, 11-00

Although the 2006-07 budget indicates deficit spending, it is a result of the approved plan to move the office back to the SDA campus.

Cafeteria Fund, 13-00

It is anticipated that the Cafeteria Fund will enjoy a good year financially, due to the contract with the Del Mar Elementary District. Operationally, the department will accommodate increased demand at Canyon Crest Academy with no additional staff. Expenditures have been increased to reflect step increases, and 5% increase in health benefit costs. The cost of food and supplies are projected to increase by 5%.

Deferred Maintenance Fund, 14-00

The two revenue sources for this fund are state and district; unlike some prior years, the state has fully funded their share recently. Expenditures in this fund are determined by a district submitted, 5 year plan which is approved by the state. The declining balance is attributable to the district maintaining the aggressive 5 year plan, mostly at the older campuses [TPHS, EWMS, and OCMS]. In the future, the 5 year plan will be adjusted, while continuing to meet the needs of the district, and maintaining a modest balance in this fund.

Special Reserve Other Than Capital Outlay, 17-42

This fund helped the district meet reserve requirements in 2006-07. In the approved General Fund budget, all income received for Mandated Cost reimbursements will be transferred to the Special Reserve Fund. This transfer will cause the estimated ending balance as of June 30, 2007 to exceed the fund balance at the beginning of this fiscal year.

Building Fund, 21-09

This fund is used exclusively to account for one-time income from North City West JPA, and expenditures for CCA. The balance will diminish until funds are depleted.

Capital Facilities, 25-18

Developer fees generated by agreements before 1987; this is a dwindling resource fund. More information and data is included which reflect income and expenditures by object code.

Capital Facilities, 25-19

Used for developer fees collected after 1987 and before many of the currently established Mello-Roos districts were formed. The use of these funds is limited to capital expenditures related to enrollment growth.

Special Reserve for Capital Projects, 40-00

This fund is now used to account for income and expenses related to the Field of Dreams at LCC.

Self-Insurance Fund, 67-16

This fund is used as an escrow account for funds generated as a result of participation in the insurance waiver program for certificated staff. The balance in this fund grows until a distribution is agreed upon between the district and SDFA.

Deductible Insurance Loss Fund, 67-30

This fund is used to pay deductible amounts on insurance claims and to pay for repairs and reimbursements when claims are not made to insurance providers.
