The Governing Board of the San Dieguito Union High School District held a Board Workshop on Tuesday, May 5, 2009, at 4:05 PM at the above location.

CALL TO ORDER

President Dalessandro called the meeting to order at 4:05 PM.

INFORMATION ITEMS

2. STATE BUDGET UPDATE - DAVE WALRATH

Mr. Steve Ma introduced guest speaker, Mr. Dave Walrath to address this agenda item. Mr. Walrath stated the combined total revenue deterioration anticipated for 2009/10 and 2010/11 is between \$10 billion –and \$14 billion. He also reviewed key points of Propositions 1A through 1E (pending special election scheduled for May 19, 2009), and said Props 1A and 1B would affect public education most directly.

Mr. Walrath addressed exclusions and implications of flexibility in Categorical Funds received by the state. He also discussed Federal Stimulus options regarding operational funds, school facilities improvement bonds and qualified bonds and block grants for energy conservation.

3. DISTRICT BUDGET UPDATE - STEVE MA / ERIC DILL

Associate Superintendent Steve Ma and Executive Director Eric Dill gave an analysis on the district's Basic Aid status and discussed differences between Revenue Limit Funding and Basic Aid Funding. They stated that property tax is up by 6% from the prior year and, although not yet official, the San Diego County Office of Education has informed County Tax Services and the California Department of Education that San Dieguito Union High School District is expected to be certified as Basic Aid for 2008/2009. Mr. Dill also discussed interdistrict transfer policy implications in light of Basic Aid status.

Mr. Ma discussed the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act Stabilization Fund and explained steps for eligibility and timelines for funding.

Mr. Ma gave an Actuarial Update of the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB 45) Statement and explained fundamental changes.

4. LONG RANGE FACILITIES TASK FORCE UPDATE

Mr. Ma updated the Board on the Long Range Facilities Task Force Committee, which has held several meetings this year. He also discussed future goals established by the committee. The next meeting is scheduled for May 19th.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES UPDATES AND REPORTS......(ITEM 8) Ms. Dalessandro attended a district office luncheon; a Solana Beach City Council meeting with Mr. Noah and Earl Warren Middle School Principal Anna Pedroza, where the City Council recognized Earl Warren Middle School for its excellence in education; a meeting with Mr. Steve Ma and representatives from the City of Carlsbad regarding a project called *Envision*; an *Honoring* Our Own county-wide dinner event that honors outstanding school district employees; a Facilities Long Range Task Force Planning Committee meeting; and spent two evenings at Torrey Pines High School interviewing student scholarship applicants. Ms. Friedman attended the Honoring Our Own dinner event; the district office staff luncheon; and the board workshops held earlier that day. Ms. Hergesheimer attended the Encinitas City Liaison meeting; met with Mr. Noah and a Strategic Planning Sub-committee to discuss next steps in the Strategic Planning process; attended a district office staff luncheon; attended a performance of San Dieguito Academy's Bye, Bye Birdie; and attended the Facilities Board Workshop prior to this Board Meeting. organized by the City of Solana Beach.

Superintendent Noah gave an update on the H1N1 Virus and announced new guidelines released earlier that day by the Center for Disease Control and the U.S. Health & Human Services Department that allow schools to remain open. Mr. Noah stated that no one in this district has been reported to have tested positive for the H1N1 Virus.

Superintendent Noah also handed out copies of a Strategic Planning Committee Packet, to be presented and discussed at the next Strategic Planning Committee meeting of May 27th. More updates will follow as the committee establishes clearer definition of the district's vision, values and commitment towards a 21st century world class education.

- 3. Meet twice yearly with site principals and advisory committees to determine CTE program direction for those sites.

Progress to date:

- 1. Counseling workshops. This effort was started November 7, 2008 with a multi-district counselor meeting, hosted by Mira Costa Community College and the San Dieguito Union High School District. District counselors reported activities and then broke out by district to develop articulation strategies for district sites. San Dieguito counselors identified barriers to middle school/high school articulation and are working on strategies to overcome those barriers. The second CTE counselor workshop took place on January 13, 2009. Discussion over the interface of interest survey software utilized at the two levels were held to help with incoming ninth grade career plans. The March 26, 2009 CTE counseling meeting was to continue the articulation discussions in preparation for eighth grade student/parent orientation meetings. This meeting and the final May 5, 2009 counselor meeting have been discontinued at the direction of the district administration due to the negative fiscal conditions of the current year. CTE teacher presentations have been made at all middle school sites and the articulation of middle to high school student/parent CTE programs have been much better served for the efforts expended.
- 2. Parent orientation meetings have been held at each high school site (4). Sites have been slow to develop this process; however, each site has sent parent and business representatives to the district CTE advisory meeting held on February 4, 2009. Sites have also determined representatives to the April 16, 2009 CTE Planning Initiative meeting. District CTE managers will continue work with site principals to establish site CTE Advisory Committees.

- 3. The first round of CTE program planning has been held with site principals. Discussion of next year's CTE programs of study was the focus of these meetings. Site principals will attend the CTE Planning Initiative event and will break out with staff and site advisors for site specific planning.
- 2. How has the district improved, enhanced, or expanded career technical education for students during 2008-09?
 - 1. Development of a Health/Biotech program with the following program of study components: Health Essentials (participant) Biotech I & 2 (concentrator) with an approved program of study agreement from Mira Costa Community College.
 - 2. Development of the Biotech facility for the above program. This facility is partially complete with equipment, facility modifications in the construction phase. The additional required facility improvements had been frozen but a combination of redirected grant monies and district funding has put the project on schedule for completion this summer.
 - 3. Development of the Welding Technology program of study with links to the Welding Technology program at Palomar Community College.
 - 4. Combined district/Perkins facility improvements to two older CTE site facilities. These two facilities were completed during the 1973-74 school year and have not received significant upgrades since construction.
 - A. San Dieguito Academy Wood Technology facility electrical upgrades, dust collection upgrades-district funded. Equipment upgrades \$10,250.00-district funded.
 - B. San Dieguito Academy Automotive Technology facility upgrade-parking lot drainage and repair. Perkins funded equipment-\$8.965.00.
 - C. San Dieguito Academy Metals Technology facility upgrade of \$60,000 for electrical upgrades and lighting.
 - D. San Dieguito Academy Graphics facility, computer lab upgrade and access door addition, \$12,000.
 - E. Torrey Pines High School Wood Technology district funded equipment upgrade-\$2,428.00
 - F. Torrey Pines High School Automotive Technology Perkins funded equipment-\$6,315.00
 - G. Torrey Pines High School Photo/Media Technology-Perkins equipment-\$2,002.00.
 - 5. Completion of two middle school Technology (SMART) Labs with additional modules and repairs. District funded \$8,000.00
 - 6. Development of a new program of study-Fashion Design/Merchandising at two district high school sites. Canyon Crest Academy and Torrey Pines high School.
 - 7. Development of a new program of study-3D Animation/Computer Game Design- Canyon Crest Academy.
 - 8. Development of a new program of study-Broadcast Journalism-La Costa Canyon High School.
- 3. Identify at least three specific outcomes from the local CTE Plan on which the district will focus in 2009-2010.
 - 1. Develop a district-wide plan for CTE marketing and outreach with a specialist employed on either a volunteer or paid basis.
 - 2. Complete the reconstruction of the district CTE web page.
 - 3. Develop a CTE survey instrument to assess the needs, desires, and outcomes of students enrolled in CTE programs of study.

4. How will Perkins IV funds support the implementation of the identified outcomes in 2009-2010?

Perkins funds will be utilized to partially fund a marketing and recruitment staff member to develop a CTE brand for the district. This person will work with district and site administration as well as parent and business partners. This person will also coordinate CTE fund raising activities through parent foundations and district advisory committees.

Perkins funding along with district matching funds will be utilized to add equipment and technical upgrades to CTE programs that have satisfied the requirements for program of study inclusion per the state and local CTE plan.

Professional development activities aimed at CTE/core academic integration and standards alignment will be supported with Perkins funds. This includes release time for instructors and travel to such events as Career Pathways Consortium Workshops.

Development of a professional CTE survey instrument will be initiated with the use of Perkins funding. The district will contact local universities in an attempt to combine resources in the development of this assessment tool.

Site principals confer with CTE management staff when Career Tech instructors are needed at their facility. To improve chances of finding qualified CTE teachers, the district authorizes CTE conference attendance and advertising in classified job listings. Bimonthly meetings held at the San Diego County Office of Education and e-mail postings give CTE managers opportunity to network on the subject of teacher availability and program staffing needs. Potential teachers are sometimes sought through the CITEA list and other teacher organizations. CTE teachers are encouraged to recruit students that show an interest in teaching careers in general and CTE teaching careers specifically.
- b. Industry professionals with CTE teaching interests are often referred to the CTE manager and recruited through one-on-one consultation with that person. That service includes an informal work experience evaluation and assistance with letters of work experience documentation. The San Diego County Office of Education works closely with district Human Resources staff to process teacher credential requests and aid in the supply of qualified instructors. The SDCOE is presently going through the Commission of Teacher Credentialing accreditation process and all ROP managers are being interviewed by that commission.

The following district CTE goals were established for the 2008-009 school year:

- 1. Conduct four intra district counseling workshops that focus on the articulation of clear CTE pathways from middle to high school.
- 2. Conduct parent orientation meetings at each site with the goal of developing CTE advisory committees at each site.
- 3. Meet twice yearly with site principals and advisory committees to determine CTE program direction for those sites.

Progress to date:

- 1. Counseling workshops. This effort was started November 7, 2008 with a multi-district counselor meeting, hosted by Mira Costa Community College and the San Dieguito Union High School District. District counselors reported activities and then broke out by district to develop articulation strategies for district sites. San Dieguito counselors identified barriers to middle school/high school articulation and are working on strategies to overcome those barriers. The second CTE counselor workshop took place on January 13, 2009. Discussion over the interface of interest survey software utilized at the two levels were held to help with incoming ninth grade career plans. March 26, 2009 CTE counseling meeting continued the articulation discussions in preparation for eighth grade student/parent orientation meetings. CTE teacher presentations have been made at all middle school sites. The last meeting or 2008-09 is scheduled for May 5, 2009.
- 2. Parent/student orientation meetings have been held at each high school site (4). Sites have been slow to develop this process; however, each site has sent parent and business representatives to the district CTE advisory meeting held on February 4, 2009. Sites have also determined representatives to the April 16, 2009 CTE Planning Initiative meeting. District CTE managers will work with site principals to establish site CTE Advisory Committees.
- 3. The first round of CTE program planning has been held with site principals. Discussion of next year's CTE programs of study was the focus of these meetings. Site principals will attend the CTE Planning Initiative event and will break out with staff and site advisors for site specific planning.

- 2. How has the district improved, enhanced, or expanded career technical education for students during 2008-09?
 - 1. Development of a Health/Biotech program with the following program of study components: Health Essentials (participant) Biotech I & 2 (concentrator) with an approved program of study agreement from Mira Costa Community College.
 - 2. Development of the Biotech facility for the above program. This facility is partially complete with equipment, facility modifications in place and additional facility improvements frozen until the district budget position is established.
 - 3. Development of the Welding Technology program of study with links to the Welding Technology program at Palomar Community College.
 - 4. Combined district/Perkins facility improvements to two older CTE site facilities. These two facilities were completed during the 1973-74 school year and have not received significant upgrades since construction.
 - A. San Dieguito Academy Wood Technology facility electrical upgrades, dust collection upgrades-district funded. Equipment upgrades \$10,250.00-district funded.
 - B. San Dieguito Academy Automotive Technology facility upgrade-parking lot drainage and repair. Perkins funded equipment-\$8,965.00.
 - C. San Dieguito Academy Metals Technology facility upgrade of \$60,000 for electrical upgrades and lighting.
 - D. San Dieguito Academy Graphics facility, computer lab upgrade and access door addition, \$12,000.
 - E. Torrey Pines High School Wood Technology district funded equipment upgrade-\$2,428.00
 - F. Torrey Pines High School Automotive Technology Perkins funded equipment-\$6,315.00
 - G. Torrey Pines High School Photo/Media Technology-Perkins equipment-\$2,002.00.

- 3. Identify at least three specific outcomes from the local CTE Plan on which the district will focus in 2009-2010.
 - 1. Develop a district-wide plan for CTE marketing and outreach with a specialist employed on either a volunteer or paid basis.
 - 2. Complete the reconstruction of the district CTE web page.
 - 3. Develop a CTE survey instrument to assess the needs, desires, and outcomes of students enrolled in CTE programs of study.
- 4. How will Perkins IV funds support the implementation of the identified outcomes in 2009-2010?

Perkins funds will be utilized to partially fund a marketing and recruitment staff member to develop a CTE brand for the district. This person will work with district and site administration as well as parent and business partners. This person will also coordinate CTE fund raising activities through parent foundations and district advisory committees.

Perkins funding along with district matching funds will be utilized to add equipment and technical upgrades to CTE programs that have satisfied the requirements for program of study inclusion per the state CTE plan.

Professional development activities aimed at CTE/core academic integration and standards alignment will be supported with Perkins funds. This includes release time for instructors and travel to such events as Career Pathways Consortium Workshops.

Development of a professional CTE survey instrument will be initiated with the use of Perkins funding. The district will contact local universities in an attempt to combine resources in the development of this assessment tool.

Continued staffing of instructional assistants for evening ROP programs aimed at adult students that have completed the Adult School ESL program and students that need assistance as they train to enter the workplace or upgrade career skills.

- a. District administration attempts to recruit qualified CTE teachers with nationwide postings on the EdJoin system. Site principals confer with CTE management staff when Career Tech instructors are needed at their facility. To improve chances of finding qualified CTE teachers, the district authorizes CTE conference attendance and advertising in classified job listings. Bimonthly meetings held at the San Diego County Office of Education and e-mail postings give CTE managers opportunity to network on the subject of teacher availability and program staffing needs. Potential teachers are sometimes sought through the CITEA list and other teacher organizations. CTE teachers are encouraged to recruit students that show an interest in teaching careers in general and CTE teaching careers specifically.
- b. Industry professionals with CTE teaching interests are often referred to the CTE manager and recruited through one-on-one consultation with that person. That service includes an informal work experience evaluation and assistance with letters of work experience documentation. The San Diego County Office of Education works closely with district Human Resources staff to process teacher credential requests and aid in the supply of qualified instructors. The SDCOE is presently going through the Commission of Teacher Credentialing accreditation process and all ROP managers are being interviewed by that commission.

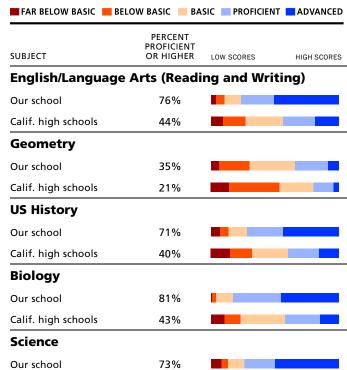

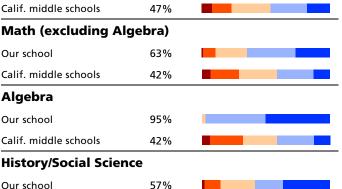

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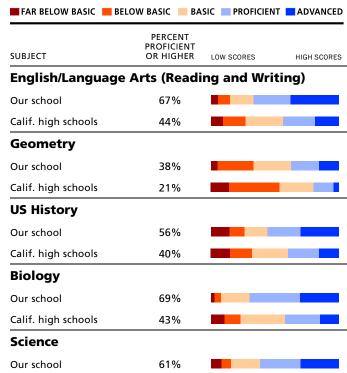

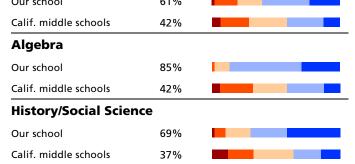

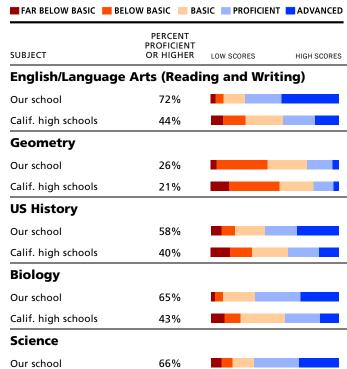

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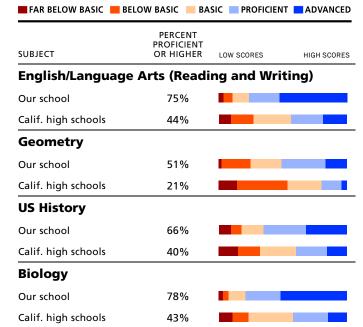

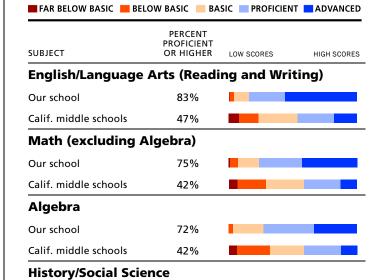

ACADEMIC PERFORMANCE INDEX (API): This is California's way of rating schools. Using student test scores, the API places schools on a scale from 200 to 1000. Our school's API was 924, compared with 743 for the average middle school. The state expects schools to attain an API of 800 eventually.

ADEQUATE YEARLY PROGRESS (AYP): This is a federal measure that requires schools to meet test score goals schoolwide and for all subgroups* of students. We met all nine criteria for yearly progress. As a result, we succeeded at making AYP. Note that the number of criteria may vary from school to sphere!

WHEREAS, on March 5, 2009, the Board of Trustees (the "Board") of the San Dieguito Union High School District (the "District") adopted a resolution entitled "Resolution of the Board of Trustees of the San Dieguito Union High School District Acting as the Legislative Body of the San Dieguito Union High School District Community Facilities District No. 95-2" (the "Resolution") annexing certain territory into Community Facilities District No. 95-2 of the School District, authorizing the levy of a special tax, authorizing the incurrence of bonded indebtedness not to exceed \$50,000,000 and calling an election on May 12, 2009.

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Resolution, a special election was held and conducted in the District on May 12, 2009, at which election there was submitted to the qualified voters of the District the following bond proposition, to wit:

Proposition No. Y: Shall Community Facilities District No. 95-2 of the San Dieguito Union High School District incur an indebtedness and issue bonds in the maximum aggregate principal amount of \$50,000,000, for a maximum term of not more than 35 years with interest not to exceed the maximum interest rate permitted by law, the proceeds of which will be used to pay for the cost of acquiring, leasing and/or construction school facilities and equipment and other facilities to be used in conjunction with school facilities and for certain incidental expenses; shall a special tax as provided in the Resolution of Formation with respect to the District be levied to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds and to pay for leasing, construction and/or acquisition of the facilities and equipment described above; shall an appropriations limit be established for the District equal to the amount of all proceeds of the special tax collected annually as adjusted for changes in the cost of living and changes in population.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees has received from Stephen G. Ma, the Election Official appointed by the Board with respect to the election, the certificate attached hereto as Appendix A and hereby incorporated by reference which certifies that more than two-thirds votes cast at the election were cast in favor of incurring bonded indebtedness, levying certain special taxes and establishing an appropriations limit for the District.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE SAN DIEGUITO UNION HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT DOES HEREBY RESOLVE, DETERMINE AND ORDER as follows:

Section 1. That more than two-thirds of the votes cast at a special election which was duly and legally held and conducted in the District on May 12, 2009 were cast in favor of incurring bonded indebtedness in an amount of \$50,000,000, levying certain special taxes and establishing an appropriations limit for the District.

Section 2. This Resolution shall take effect upon adoption.

Special Funds - Overview

Information relative to special funds, other than the General Fund, gives a brief description of the activities of the fund, specific projects, and financial trends.

Adult Education Fund, 11-00

The Adult Education Fund is used to account separately for federal, state, and local revenues related to adult education programs. San Dieguito Adult Education provides a wealth of educational and recreational programs for the community, including high school diploma classes, English as a second language, programs for senior citizens, a host of cultural and personal enrichment courses, and recreation activities.

Cafeteria Fund, 13-00

School lunch nutrition standards have caused increased expenses and decreased revenue for the last few years. As a result, menus, staffing and productivity are constantly evaluated to ensure the district is providing wholesome, nutritious meals that are attractive to its customers and can be sold at a reasonable price. The contract with Del Mar Union is in the third year and participation averages 1200 meals per day. Nutrition Services continues to hone its marketing efforts and will further enhance technology to provide faster meal service. Managing the challenges of open campuses and single lunch periods continues.

Deferred Maintenance Fund, 14-00

The two revenue sources for this fund are state and district. Under the current state budget, the state will continue to contribute toward this fund at the 2007-08 level. The district has the option to waive its matching contribution; however, it will continue to make the contribution in order to fund necessary facility repairs and improvements. Expenditures in this fund are determined by a district submitted 5 year plan which is approved by the state. The declining balance is attributable to the district maintaining the aggressive 5 year plan, mostly at the older campuses. In the future, the 5 year plan will be adjusted, while continuing to meet the needs of the district, and maintaining a modest balance in this fund.

Pupil Transportation Equipment Fund, 15-00

This fund was created for the purpose of accounting separately for income and expenses related to the acquisition of pupil transportation equipment. Two special education buses were purchased from this fund in 2008-09.

Special Reserve Other Than Capital Outlay, 17-42

The purpose of this fund is to supplement the opening of new schools and possibly GASB 45 obligations. This fund helped the district meet reserve requirements in 2006-07.

Building Fund, 21-09

This fund is used exclusively to account for one-time income from North City West JPA. The balance will diminish until funds are depleted.

Capital Facilities, 25-18

Used for developer fees generated by agreements before 1987, this is a dwindling resource fund.

Capital Facilities, 25-19

Used for developer fees collected after 1987 and before many of the currently established Mello-Roos districts were formed. The use of these funds are limited to capital expenditures related to enrollment growth.

County School Facilities Fund, 35-00

This fund is used exclusively to account for income from the state for construction of school facilities.

Special Reserve for Capital Projects, 40-00

This fund is being used by the TPHS Foundation for architectural expenses relating to the Visual Performing Arts Center at TPHS, as well as the San Dieguito Academy Foundation for expenses related to the Biotech Lab classroom conversion at SDA. This fund balance will decline until all funds are depleted.

Self-Insurance Fund, 67-16

This fund is used as an escrow account for funds generated as a result of participation in the insurance waiver program for certificated staff. The balance in this fund grows until a distribution is agreed upon between the district and the San Dieguito Faculty Association.

Other Post Employment Benefits Fund, 67-17

This fund is used as an escrow account to fund the annual "pay-as-you-go" amount for Other Post Employment Benefits (OPEB). The General Fund makes contributions to this fund and then premiums are paid from this account. Assets do not count toward the unfunded OPEB liability as the funds are not held in a special trust.

Deductible Insurance Loss Fund, 67-30

This fund is used to pay deductible amounts on insurance claims and to pay for repairs and reimbursements when claims are not made to insurance providers.
