The Board took unanimous action to approve the stipulated expulsion of Student #588680 and Student #633451. The Board also took action to approve a 10-day suspension without pay and involuntary transfer of employee #25303. Motions on both actions were unanimously carried.

6. APPROVAL OF MINUTES / REGULAR MEETING AND BOARD WORKSHOP, MARCH 4, 2010 (ITEM 6) It was moved by Ms. Dalessandro, seconded by Ms. Rich, that the Minutes of the March 11th and March 15th, 2010 Board Meetings be approved as written. Motion unanimously carried.

Non-Action Items (Items 7 - 10)

Ms. Dalessandro attended the unveiling ceremony for the new mosaic mural at the Earl Warren Library; visited the Earl Warren Middle School campus with Ms. Hergesheimer; and attended the "Pump Up the Volume" Torrey Pines Foundation Fundraiser.

Ms. Friedman accompanied Mr. Noah on a tour of the San Dieguito Academy Biotech Lab. Community partners also visited the lab.

Ms. Groth attended a meeting with the North Coastal Consortium for Special Education, (NCCSE). Discussion included the differences between Basic Aid and Revenue Limit Funding and how reductions may affect current funding for NCCSE. Ms. Groth also announced that NCCSE's Senior Director, Mr. Joe Schwartzberg, will be retiring at the end of this year.

Ms. Hergesheimer attended another Encinitas General Plan Meeting.

Ms. Rich attended a Regional Legislative Action Network (LAN) meeting with Mr. Noah, which featured an update from a demographer from SANDAG. Ms. Rich also said the unveiling ceremony of the mosaic mural at EWMS Library was impressive and left everybody that was present with a good feeling about the project.

- - Mr. Noah addressed the 2010-11 budget and stated that as it stands, the gap between actual revenue and expenditures is close to \$7.5 million. Some savings will come from the elimination of several positions including teaching, school classified, district office, and maintenance and operations positions, as well as a reduction in non-personnel expenditures.

Mr. Calen also talked about a new breakfast program, which has proven to be highly successful, (over 200 breakfast meals served daily for the past three weeks).

Mr. Calen said progress continues at Oak Crest Middle School and complimented his new assistant principal, Mike Modeer for his leadership and knowledge.

After a brief introduction by the Superintendent, the following public comments were presented:

- J. McKirdy, SDUHSD Employee
- D Windle, SDUHSD Employee

Both, Ms. McKirdy and Ms. Windle addressed concerns regarding the possible elimination of transportation services to students and outlined those concerns in a letter written by Ms. McKirdy, as well as in the oral comments made by both employees.

The Board thanked Ms. McKirdy and Ms. Windle for their comments and then deliberated on the three options as follows:

Ms. Dalessandro – stated there are compelling reasons for keeping the transportation service as is. She stated doubling the fee was not a good option; elimination of services would increase the number of vehicles on the road, which is bad for the environment; and students in high school are not as easily transported as students coming from elementary districts, (longer distances between home/school, walking may not be an option for many students). She acknowledged that neighboring elementary districts no longer offer these services but students there can walk, can be walked, or can ride their bikes to and from school because the distances are shorter.

Ms. Hergesheimer asked staff to show long term impacts on the financing and cost.

Ms. Friedman agreed with Ms. Dalessandro's concerns and stated that a substantial increase to ridership fees is prohibitive in some areas; that being said, the fee could still be raised somewhat. Ms. Friedman recalled the fee was raised approximately two years ago to \$500. Ms. Friedman also posed the following questions: How much did that increase affect ridership? If the fee goes up, what would raising the fee do to ridership now? What impact will this have on students when they enter the 9th grade, considering that these students would still not be able to drive? Ms. Friedman stated she does not believe it would be in everybody's best interest to do this anytime soon and recommended that the district either maintain the status quo or find out how it would impact families.

Ms. Rich agreed with the previous concerns mentioned by Board members. She stated that it would particularly affect students from Carmel Valley that currently are attending Earl Warren because of lack of space at Carmel Valley Middle School. Ms. Dee proposes that, if necessary, the fee increase, but the service remain.

Ms. Groth asked the administration to find out how many of our student riders are also on free or reduced lunch assistance. Ms. Groth would like answers to the following questions: Is this the population that is going to be the hardest hit? On the environmental issue, is there some kind of non-educational grant available for schools that choose to use school bus transportation services in exchange for emissions reduction? How many buses does the district use to meet the needs of special education transportation services?

Mr. Noah summarized the Board's comments to indicate that their preference is to not discontinue transportation services, and would be sharing these comments with his Cabinet Team within the following week. Until further notice, transportation services will continue to be provided.

20. Approval of Ratification of Contract Extension, San Dieguito Faculty Association Approval of Ratification of Contract Extension with San Dieguito Faculty Association, (SDFA), as shown.

The following public comments were presented:

- J. McKirdy, SDUHSD Employee Ms. McKirdy expressed a concern about the approval of this item because of the current budget constraints that are impacting the district as a whole.
- Bob Croft, President, San Dieguito Faculty Association Mr. Croft spoke in favor of the SDFA Contract Extension and urged the Board to approve the contract as presented, and said teachers view the EL stipend as an incentive to maintain an authorization which is required by the state for 100% of the teaching staff.

With the loss of Categorical Funding, the district faces an additional shortfall in revenue for home-to-school transportation of \$482,921 for the 2010-11 school year. Three possible options for addressing this issue are presented for Board consideration and input.

Option 1

Eliminate home-to-school transportation for the 2010-11 school year. Notification would be provided this S pring to the families of current and incoming 7th grade students informing them that the service will not be provided.

Option 2

Eliminate home-to-school transportation for the 2011-12 school year. Notification would be provided to the families of incoming 7 th grade students informing them that the service would be provided for one year only, and then cease to exist in 2011-12.

Option 3

Continue to provide home-to-school transportation.

At pr esent, ho me-to-school t ransportation is pr ovided for middle s chool students only. Approximately 23% of current 7th and 8th grade students utilize the service. N one of the five el ementary f eeder di stricts pr ovide hom e-to-school s ervice. N either is the s ervice provided at the high school level in this district.

The annual **gross savings** to the district in Options 1 & 2 would be \$843,523. The loss of parent revenue coupled with the gain in General Fund savings would yield an annual **net savings** to the district of \$909,167. O ption 3 w ould require an annual General Fund **contribution** of \$482,921, unless ridership fees are increased by 100% to cover that amount.

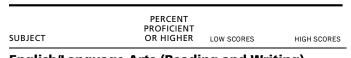

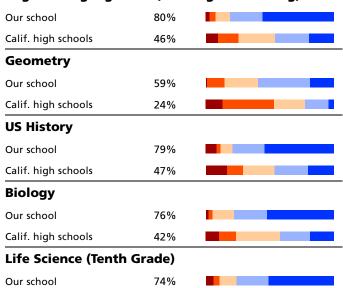

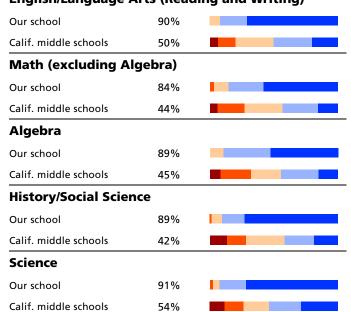

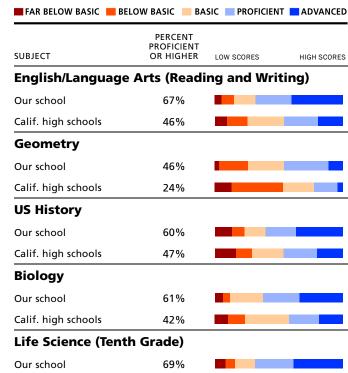

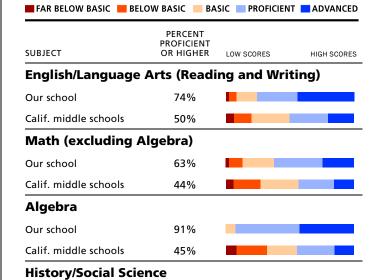

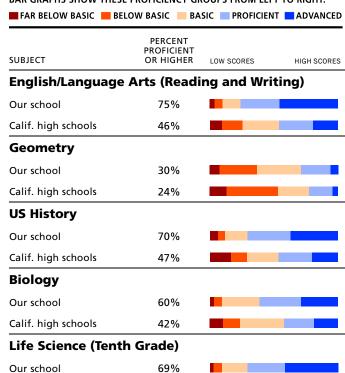

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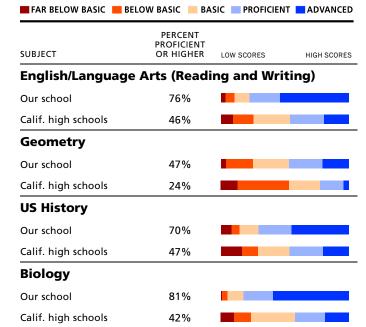

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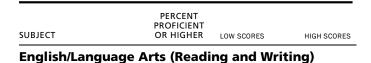

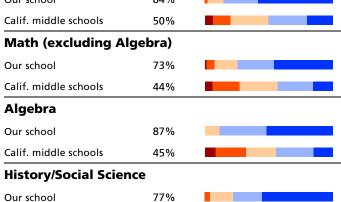

SUBJECT: ADOPTION OF THE 2009-10 SPRING

REVISION DISTRICT BUDGET

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

During the current fiscal year, the administration has taken a revised budget to the Board three times since the adoption in June. The Fall Revision, First Interim and Second Interim reports are required by state law; the Spring Revision is presented to update the Board on changes that have occurred since Second Interim and to project year-end General Fund revenue, expense, and ending balances. Although the Spring Revision includes the most recent data available, actual 2009-10 income and expenditure information will not be confirmed until the books are closed on the current fiscal year September.

The transition to Basic Aid has provided for more stability in the district's budgeting during the last year. While there is still some measure of uncertainty surrounding the level of state funding and changes in property tax revenue we can expect in the next fiscal year, the current year has not seen the drastic fluctuations in budget assumptions that characterized the 2008-09 fiscal year and last June's budget adoption process.

With respect to income, Property Tax revenue is tracking with our projections. Federal and State categorical revenue is down due to deferrals to 2010-11 and adjusting budgeted revenue to match actual grant amounts. Local revenue has increased from college testing, donation, and facility rental revenue.

Expenditures have increased primarily due to the addition of the English Language Authorization stipend agreed to in the contract with SDFA along with college testing fees and expenses arising from donations. These increases are typically seen at Spring Revision. Increases are net of numerous budget reductions made in other department and program areas since Second Interim.

The Estimated Unspent amount of \$1,131,062 is based on actual amounts that have been set aside to be carried over into 2010-11. While we expect to realize additional savings at year-end from unspent balances in both unrestricted and restricted funds, it is difficult to estimate at this time as we have been actively lowering unrestricted budgets throughout the year when anticipated expenditures have fallen below budgeted amounts.

The projected ending balance has improved due to increased revenue and identifying carry-over amounts that will be unspent in the current fiscal year.

Detailed information for income and expenditures can be found on the following pages. Final 2009-10 income and expenditures will be reported to the Board in September when the books are closed.

Please be advised that the majority of the budget reduction targets presented to the board by the Superintendent have not been incorporated in the Spring Revision. Those reductions will be included in the 2010/11 adopted budget as they are finalized.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board adopt the 2009-10 Spring Revision District Budget, as shown in the attached supplements.

SUBJECT: PROPOSED NEW BOARD POLICY 3111 &

3111/AR-1, "BUDGET RESERVE FUNDS"

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The district transitioned into a Basic Aid (BA) funding status starting in 2008-09. Unless there is a massive restoration of the revenue limit maintenance factor, or there is legislative action to disallow the BA funding model, staff believes the district will maintain its BA status for many years to come.

As a Basic Aid district, budget risks are significantly greater and the need for a larger or separate BA reserve is fiscally prudent. In reviewing the existing board policy on budget reserves, there lacks sufficient policy guidelines for the creation, maintenance, and use of budget reserves. Staff has conceptually outlined for the Board, the need for a separate BA reserve at the November 18, 2008, and November 12, 2009, budget workshops. Budgetary risks to BA districts include:

- Funding is no longer based on student attendance and state aid losing the state safety net
- Fluctuations in property values compared to changes in enrollment can significantly change the district's revenue outlook.
- BA districts may be subject to further cuts (Fair Share Reductions) or legislative action to equalize funding between districts.

Staff has worked with legal counsel to develop a new board policy and administrative regulation on budget reserves. The proposed policy identifies the creation of two separate reserves within the unrestricted General fund: a General Reserve, and a Basic Aid Reserve. The General Reserve would be maintained at the legal minimum of 3%. The BA Reserve would be allowed to grow, if the year over year comparison of property taxes indicated an increase. The AR calls for 50% of the year over year increase to be

put into the BA reserve. Excess taxes not allocated to the reserves can be used for other district priorities. The General and Basic Aid reserves would combine to a minimum of 7.5% of the unrestricted General fund. The Basic Aid Reserve would only be drawn down below its minimum 4.5% in the event of an unexpected increase in enrollment, a decrease in property tax revenue, or loss of additional outside revenue sources that would necessitate drawing upon the reserves.

It is important to note that since cuts to the Funded Revenue Limit caused the District to fall into Basic Aid, our funding level per student is still below the state's Base Revenue Limit. The Base Revenue Limit is what the state should be paying school districts under Prop 98 and other statutory requirements. The proposed target minimum funding for the BA reserve is the difference between the property taxes received and the state's base revenue limit. At some point, district property taxes will likely exceed the base revenue limit, at which time, the Board may want to consider other criteria for the minimum funding level for the BA reserve.

There have been staff discussions about how this reserve policy would fit with the recently approved SDFA compensation language. Based on the following example, staff believes the district can fund the necessary reserves while maintaining a competitive salary structure. In the follow example, staff assumes a hypothetical 1% property tax increase.

RECOMMENDATION:

BUDGET RESERVE FUNDS

General Reserve

The district shall maintain a reserve, within the General fund, in an amount of not less than three percent (3%) or the amount required by the State of California, whichever is less.

Basic Aid Reserve

As a basic aid district, fluctuations in property values as well as the potential for cuts or other legislative action can change the district's revenue outlook, affecting basic aid revenue. In order to offset any such reduction or fluctuations in revenue, the district will maintain a Basic Aid Reserve, within the General fund, in addition to any other reserve fund established by this Board. The Basic Aid Reserve shall be separate from all other funds and shall only be used as specified in this policy.

Basic Aid Reserve may be used only to fund expenses related to changes in enrollment, offsets to decreases in property tax revenue, non-recurring expenses, and ongoing expenses in deficit years. The Basic Aid Reserve shall not be a special reserve fund but rather shall be a component of the ending balance of the district's General fund.

Funding the Basic Aid Reserve

The target minimum funding for the Basic Aid Reserve shall be an amount at least equal to the difference between the property tax revenue received by the district and the base revenue limit allocated to the district by the State of California.

The Superintendent is authorized to develop regulations to implement this policy. This policy may be reviewed by the Board of Trustees at any time. It will be reviewed when the Basic Aid Reserve reaches its target.

As part of the approval of the annual budget, the Board shall consider any proposed use of Basic Aid Reserve Fund principal and income and shall take separate action to approve such uses.

BUDGET RESERVE FUNDS

Utilization of Reserve Funds

The amount allocated annually to the Basic Aid Reserve will be equal to fifty percent (50%) of the differential between the district's property tax revenue over the amount of the prior year's property tax revenue. The differential is to be calculated prior to adoption of the annual budget and recalculated and reconciled based on the actual property tax collected for the current fiscal year and the estimate of the property tax revenue for the subsequent fiscal year.

The transfer of funds into the Basic Aid Reserve will take place to the extent that funds are needed to bring the Basic Aid Reserve toward the target amount set forth in board policy 3111.

A draw on the Basic Aid Reserve may be made if the following conditions occur which result in a budget shortfall for a given fiscal year:

- 1. An unexpected increase in enrollment.
- 2. A decrease in property tax revenue.
- 3. Loss of additional outside revenue sources.

If there is a need to utilize funds from a reserve, funds from the Basic Aid Reserve fund shall be used before funds from the General reserve fund.

In no event shall the combined unrestricted General Fund reserves (General and Basic Aid) fall below seven and one-half percent (7.5%) in the current fiscal year budget.

FEES/HOME-TO- SCHOOL"

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Home to School (HTS) transportation has historically been funded by a number of sources including state categorical grants (TIIG and HTS), parent pay, and the district's general fund. In 2009/10, HTS transportation is expected to encroach on the general fund by approximately \$112,000. This encroachment will increase to \$160,000 in 2010/11, and could increase to \$643,000 if the Legislative Analyst Office's recommendation to shift HTS to a Tier III categorical is adopted in the budget. An equivalent cut to basic aid districts is being applied through the "Fair Share" reduction of state categorical grants.

Staff continues to look for different ways to reduce HTS transportation costs in this difficult budget environment. At a minimum, staff is recommending a \$100 increase to the annual transportation fee. This would bring the cost of an annual bus pass to \$600 per student. Multiple student discounts would still be available for those households with more than one student taking district transportation. As the budget picture becomes clearer in 2010/11, staff will continue to consider other measures to improve efficiency and reduce operational costs.

In preparing an analysis showing the cost of transporting a student by private auto, staff has used certain assumptions, in conjunction with a common *cost of driving calculator* tool. The calculator tool allows for the costs of fuel, mileage, depreciation and insurance. The following assumptions were made:

- 1) A vehicle which averages 25 mpg fuel economy;
- 2) Round trip mileage of 10 miles, travelled 2 times per day for morning drop-off and afternoon pick-up;
- 3) Each car transporting 2 students.

The resulting cost to transport a student by private auto is \$10.10/per day, as compared to a cost of \$3.33/per day, to ride the bus at the proposed new fee, an increase from \$2.78 per day. Based on the 1200 plus bus passes sold for the 2009-10 school year, transporting students by private auto increases the number of cars on the road in the District's school zones, by over 600 vehicles per day, causing a carbon footprint of almost 900,000 pounds of CO2 per year. Additionally, the intangible cost of transportation by private auto most certainly includes student safety and the value of time.

These proposed changes effect the above cited administrative regulation. The proposed revisions are provided as an information item for review and will be returned to the next board meeting for adoption.

TRANSPORTATION FEES / HOME-TO-SCHOOL

1. Determination of District's Maximum Fee

As specified in Education Code 39807.5, the amount of the actual fee determined by the local governing board shall be no greater than the statewide average non-subsidized cost of providing this transportation to a pupil on a publicly owned or operated transit system as determined by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, in cooperation with the Department of Transportation. "Nonsubsidized cost" means actual operating costs less federal subventions.

The District's maximum fee will be computed according to the formula supplied by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction. This formula will produce the District's average cost per day per pupil and is the maximum amount that may be charged to a parent or guardian.

2. Determination of the Actual Charge to be Levied Against Each Parent or Guardian

The total amount received by the District from combined state aid for transportation and parent fees shall not exceed the actual cost of home to school transportation. The District will determine the amount of local funds expended per pupil per day, based on prior year data.

Except for those parents or guardians exempted in the policy, each parent or guardian of a pupil transported shall be charged according to the following schedule:

No money will be collected on the bus. Passes may be sold at the District's office or other locations designated by the Superintendent.

A duplicate of the student identification card photo will be placed in the bus manifest system. Parents/Guardians may designate daytime contact information on the bus pass application form. This information will also be added to the bus manifest system. Drivers will carry copies of the manifest on the bus for the students they are transporting. The manifest will serve in lieu of bus passes.

3. Determination that Parent or Guardian is "Indigent"

Eligibility for free transportation shall be based on the income eligibility scales used for the free and reduced-price lunch program. At the beginning of the school year and whenever a new student is enrolled, parents/guardians shall receive information about free transportation eligibility standards, application procedures and appeal procedures.

All applications and records related to eligibility for free transportation shall be confidential and open only for purposes directly connected with the free transportation program.

Students receiving free transportation shall not be identified by the use of special passes, tickets, lines, seats or any other means. They shall in no way be treated differently from other students, nor shall their names be published, posted or announced in any manner or used for any purpose other than the transportation program.

4. Attendance Areas

Pupils who are bus riders in the attendance area of one school but live within walking distance of another school may elect to attend the closer school as long as room is available in that school.

5. Discipline

The same rules governing conduct and behavior on the bus, as are now in effect, will be continued. Students with repeated misbehavior may be denied the privilege of riding.

6. Bus Routes and Stops

Bus routes and stops will not be changed solely for the convenience of riders or to increase ridership. The same basis currently in effect for selecting routes and stops will be continued.

7. Families Purchasing Multiple Bus Passes

Families with more than one student attending any school in the district who purchase more than one bus pass per school term shall be entitled to a twenty percent (20%) discount on the second and any subsequent passes purchased during the same school term. The first pass purchased shall be charged at the full rate. Discounts apply only to dependents living in the same household.
