

SDUHSD High School Enrollment History

- 1937-1974: One high school (SDHS), one attendance area (AA)
- 1974: Established first set of AA's for high schools (SDHS & TPHS)
- 1996: Established first non-AA school (SDHSA)
- 2004 Established second non-AA school (CCA)

SDUHSD's Current HS Enrollment Practices

- Each incoming 9th grade student declares for one of our four high schools
- 10th-12th grade students declare only if they want to change schools
- Lottery conducted if number of students declaring for SDHSA/CCA exceeds available capacity of the school waitlist if needed
- Lottery is completely random selection only priority is for siblings of continuing students
- Historically, we've given priority to 9th graders

- 8 Year District Average Freshmen Admitted to 1st Choice HS = 98.35%
- 8 Year District Average Freshmen Admitted to Non-Academies = 100%
- 8 Year District Average Freshmen Admitted to Academies = 96.70%
- Trends in enrollment choices, class size, & enrollment growth will impact the acceptance rate in the future

ITFM 2

California Law & School Enrollment

- Ed Code 35160.5 is the relevant code
- Districts must allow transfers among schools
- If transfer demand exceeds capacity, must employ a random, unbiased process in which all applicants have an equal chance (lottery)
- Legally allowable exceptions in random lottery:
 - Special circumstance involving threat of bodily harm
 - Siblings of current students
 - Sons/Daughters of employees of the school (if resident)
- Law doesn't allow geographic proximity as a priority in a lottery

CFD's & School Enrollment

- Community Facility District = Mello-Roos
 Seats available to MR students must be at least equal to the percent of school cost funded by MR
- Approximately 45% at CCA/17% at SDHSA
 SDUHSD current practice & Mello-Roos requirements

Demographic Balance in Schools


- Strongest demographic indicators of school success
 - Household income
 - Parent education level
 - Language fluency
- Perpetuation of school success
- Educational value of demographic diversity

Enrollment Options - Preface

- Total capacity is not an issue it's about balancing capacity
- HSESG developed five legal options narrowed to three after community input meetings
- There is no perfect solution with which everyone will be happy every option will upset some
- Goal is to find the option that positively impacts the greatest number of students/families
- Program equity among schools is crucial regardless of enrollment policy because choice plays a large role in all options

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
Option #1 - Attendance Areas (AA) for all HS's





Qualitative Input on Option #1 (4 AA's)

Perceived Benefits

- All guaranteed to attend school relatively close to home while still allowing choice/transfers
- Neighborhood/community schools
- Potentially establishes K-12 continuum
- Shorter commutes/Decreased traffic
- Ability to walk/bike to school
- Simplicity/Clarity/Certainty
- Establishes perception of equality among schools/Fair
- Balances enrollment
- New enrollees can attend neighborhood school

Perceived Drawbacks

- Decreases choice
- Neighborhood school might not be best fit for each student
- Schools more similar/decreases program & diversity among schools
- Changes unique culture/identity of each school
- Boundary changes are divisive & difficult - some will inevitably be unhappy with boundaries
- CFD's & demographics make pure geographic boundaries unlikely
- Reduces healthy competition
- Does not solve enrollment demand for Academy schools


Option 1 - Four Attendance Areas:

Qualitative Input on Option #2 (Mix of AA/Non-AA)

Perceived Benefits	Perceived Drawbacks
 Allows greatest choice All guaranteed enrollment at a school relatively close to home, although not necessarily closest Current lottery, if needed, is fair to all Allows for unique character & programs in schools Has worked well - no need to change because small group is unhappy Promotes healthy competition & improvement among schools Each student has equal chance to attend the "right fit" Community understands/expects it Provides diversity in student bodies 	 Some students don't get top choice Students may not be able to attend the school closest to their home forcing longer commutes/burden on families More difficult to balance enrollment - popular schools get overcrowded Doesn't guarantee CCA for those paying CFD Creates a sense of elitism at Academies Anxiety over choice/lottery Leaves some sub-communities without "neighborhood schools"

Qualitative Input on Option #3 (Small AA's)

Perceived Benefits

Perceived Drawbacks

- Gives priority to those who live nearby an Academy while maintaining choice for others
- Students within small AA's can still transfer out
- All are guaranteed to attend a school relatively close to home
- Allows kids to walk/bike to school
- Fair to those closest to an Academy
- Maintains unique cultures/programs at each school

- Small AA's would be arbitrary based upon geography (1 mile) or enrollment target
- No matter where AA boundaries are drawn, those just outside will be unhappy
- Creates a system of "haves & have nots" around Academies Elitist
- Not fair to <u>all</u> students regardless of where they live
- Decreases choice for those outside of AA's greater chance of lottery & wait lists more discontent
- Could impact property values (+/-)
- Short-sighted given likelihood of enrollment shifts in future will have to adjust boundaries
- Still doesn't guarantee all kids get top choice just changes who is unhappy, solves nothing
- If some kids will inevitably not get top choice, should be based upon random selection, not geography & economics
