Superintendent Schmitt gave an update on school opening, celebrating facilities work completed over the summer which included SDHSA, OCMS TPHS, EW and PTMS, staffing and shout out to counselors and teachers balancing, fine tuning and accommodating student schedules. Mr. Schmitt reminded the Board that there will be a soft opening event at Pacific Trails MS on September 8th at 5:30 pm.

10. SAFETY & STUDENT SUPPORT UPDATE JASON VILORIA, ED.D., ASSOCIATE SUPERINTENDENT PUBLIC COMMENTS – Cheryl Ward, whose daughter is attending PTMS, thanked the Board for a great district, and strongly opposes hiring school police on campus.

Dr. Viloria shared that updates will be presented focusing on school safety, effective and regular communication with students, families and staff, ongoing staff training, and school programs and partnerships with the community. ADL (Anti-Defamation League) training was held this morning and

Dr. Viloria shared a proclamation given by Representative Scott Peters, and shared a resource guide titled, "If we could end hatred, Imagine what more we could do...".

Tiffany Findell gave an update on the California Healthy Kids Survey and the READI program (*as presented in the attached document*) including major middle school and high school findings in Alcohol Tobacco Other Drugs (ATOD), lifetime use, connectedness, safety, and the effects of social media.

Judi Strang with the San Dieguito Alliance for Drug Free Youth (Alliance) who partners with the District gave a update on the programs and services offered by the Alliance including the Start Smart Teen Driving Program, Live 2 Graduate, Study Buddy Program, Teen Presenters, parent and community forums/parent support groups, Red Ribbon training, and the Hispanic Network, as well as information regarding MADD, and A Family Guide to Keeping Your Teens Drug-Free (*as distributed at the meeting and available in the Superintendent's Office upon request*).

Mr. Rick Ayala gave an update on suspensions, expulsions and restorative practices, which included data showing that in 2008-09 there were 669 suspensions district wide compared to 204 in 2014-15; there were 20 expulsions in 2008-09 compared to 8 expulsions in 2014-15. A number of reasons contribute to the reduction; there are District and Site safety committees, many district and school activities that promote connectedness, acceptance and inclusion, and a community culture that encourages students and parents to report concerns. Restorative practices are a proactive approach where people are more likely to make positive changes when those in positions of authority do things with them rather than to them, and where students feel a sense of ownership in regards to their behavior. There are many different levels of restorative practices and Mr. Ayala has led in-house training with administrators who in turn have trained staff at the school site level.



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

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





MAJOR HIGH SCHOOL FINDINGS <u>CONNECTEDNESS</u>

<u>Strengths</u>

- 94% of students agree a teacher or other adult at school cares about them
- Decrease in rates of rumors being spread both on campus (28% from 35%) and on the Internet (15% from 18%)

Areas for Improvement

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- 68% Feel like they are a part of school (20% report neither agree or disagree) – how do we engage those in the middle?
- Hispanic, Asian, "Other" have lowest rates on most questions surrounding school connectedness



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

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

FEES

District will be billed by Digital Schools to cover AFAS costs. \$0.50 of the \$4.00 fee for Eligible Employees is allocated to Digital Schools for administrative costs. The District will receive a bill for \$995 PLUS 50% of the fee for ACA Eligible Employees as defined herein (\$4.00 per/annually). This bill is due at the time of contractual addendum signing. The remaining 50% will be billed when the documentation is provided to employees. The remaining 50% fee may vary from the fee billed at contract outset as the ACA Eligible Employee number may adjust through the work performed. The fee will reflect this adjustment, up or down.

Delinquent amounts will be billed at one and one half percent (1.5%) per month ("Late Fee"). The Late Fee shall be assessed on the sixteenth day after invoice issuance of the month for which payment is due and every first (1^{st}) day of subsequent months until District has paid outstanding balance in full.

Depending on timing, it is Digital Schools' intent to include these fees with the District's billing cycle for monthly payers. Quarterly and annual payers will be billed separately.

District shall be responsible for actual out-of-pocket expenses (e.g., overnight charges, extensive reproduction costs) and travel costs incurred by AFAS in connection with its provision of the services. This is a fee-based relationship that exists solely between the District and AFAS.

District also shall be responsible for all sales taxes and other similar tax obligations in connection with receipt of the services. Such expenses, taxes, and other obligations shall be owed above and beyond any professional fees. If District is exempt from paying sales tax, a tax exemption certificate shall be provided to AFAS. Until such certificate is received, District will be charged applicable sales tax on the invoices.

If AFAS receives inaccurate, incomplete, or improperly formatted information, any additional time and expense required to correct the information will be billed as additional Services provided to the District by AFAS, an amount for which the District is solely responsible. Prior to conducting the work or billing the District in this circumstance, AFAS shall notify the District in writing that charges will be required to correct or complete District information.

This Contractual Addendum is subject to and governed by the terms and conditions of the Master Services Agreement and Subscription Agreement, Including all Exhibits and Attachments thereto executed and in effect between the parties.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

BACKGROUND: Since the passage of Assembly Bill 86 (AB86), MiraCosta Community College, San Dieguito Union High School District, Carlsbad Unified School District and Oceanside Unified School District have worked diligently and collectively to develop a regional adult education plan to better serve the needs of adult education students in the region. Historically, California's adult education system has been shared between the K-12 adult schools (K-12 Adult) and the community colleges. This governance structure has existed with little coordination or alignment of policy and practice.

Throughout the State, Community Colleges and K-12 districts established local planning groups, referred to as Consortia, to develop a new adult education plan. MiraCosta College and San Dieguito Union High School District, as the adult education program providers are the members of the Coastal North County Adult Education Consortium (CNCAEC). The goal of the CNCAEC is to align and increase adult education offerings in the collective district, expanding course offerings in the Consortium district.

STATUS: The California Legislature has passed Assembly Bill 104 which includes the legislation for the Adult Education Block Grant. The Adult Education Block Grant (AEBG) will fund adult education providers and the adult education regional consortia. Please refer to Sec. 39, Article 9, Section 84900. With this final language, the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office (CCCCO) and the CDE are working together to develop guidance for implementation of the Adult Education Block Grant. This guidance regarding the fund allocations, reporting requirements, and outcomes and measures will be ongoing over the coming weeks and months. With draft guidance coming from the CCCCO and the CDE, Consortia have been tasked with appointing a Board of Trustee approved "official" from each member (Adult Education Provider) of the Consortium. AB104 Section 39 Article

9 Section 84905 c reads "A member of the consortium shall be represented only by an official designated by the governing board of the member."

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board approve the Director of CTE, EL and Community Programs as the official representing SDUHSD for the Coastal North County Adult Education Consortium.

AB 104 Adult Education Block Grant

SEC. 39.

Article 9 (commencing with Section 84900) is added to Chapter 5 of Part 50 of Division 7 of Title 3 of the Education Code, to read:

Article 9. Adult Education Block Grant Program 84900.

The Adult Education Block Grant Program is hereby established under the administration of the Chancellor of the California Community Colleges and the Superintendent of Public Instruction.

84901.

For purposes of this article, the following definitions shall apply, unless otherwise specified:

(a) "Adult" means a person 18 years of age or older.

(b) "Consortium" means an adult education consortium approved pursuant to this article.

(c) "Executive director" means the executive director of the State Board of Education.

(d) "Program" means the Adult Education Block Grant Program established by Section 84900.

84902.

(a) The chancellor and the Superintendent are the state officials responsible for identifying and understanding the educational needs of adults in the state.

(b) The chancellor and the Superintendent shall use the powers provided by this article to support the effective provision of services that address the educational needs of adults in all regions of the state.

(c) In performing duties under this article, the chancellor and the Superintendent shall seek advice from, and coordinate with, other state officials responsible for programs for adults.

84903.

(a) The chancellor and the Superintendent, with the advice of the executive director, shall divide the state into adult education regions and shall determine the physical boundaries of each region.

(b) When determining the boundaries of the adult education regions, the chancellor and the Superintendent shall consider factors that impact the provision of adult education, including all of the following:

(1) Economic and demographic factors, including the locations of regional labor markets.

(2) The boundaries of regions used to distribute funds for other state programs.

(3) The presence of adult education providers that have demonstrated effectiveness in meeting the educational needs of adults.

(c) Until otherwise determined by the chancellor and the Superintendent, the physical boundaries of the adult education regions shall be the same as the physical boundaries of the regions established for purposes of providing planning and implementation grants pursuant to Section 84830.

84904.

(a) The chancellor and the Superintendent, with the advice of the executive director, shall approve one adult education consortium in each adult education region.

(b) Until otherwise determined by the chancellor and the Superintendent, the consortia to which planning and implementation grants were apportioned pursuant to Section 84830 shall be deemed approved for purposes of this section.

84905.

The chancellor and the Superintendent, with the advice of the executive director, shall approve, for each consortium, rules and procedures that adhere to all of the following conditions:

(a) Any community college district, school district, or county office of education, or any joint powers authority consisting of community college districts, school districts, county offices of education, or a combination of these, located within the boundaries of the adult education region shall be permitted to join the consortium as a member.

(b) As a condition of joining a consortium, a member shall commit to reporting any funds available to that member for the purposes of education and workforce services for adults and the uses of those funds.

(c) A member of the consortium shall be represented only by an official designated by the governing board of the member.

(d) (1) Decision making procedures are specified that ensure that all of the following conditions are satisfied:

(A) All members of the consortium shall participate in any decision made by the consortium.

(B) A proposed decision is considered at an open, properly noticed public meeting of the consortium at which members of the public may comment.

(C) The consortium has provided the public with adequate notice of a proposed decision and considered any comments submitted by members of the public, and any comments submitted by members of the public have been distributed publicly.

(D) (i) The consortium has requested comments regarding a proposed decision from other entities located in the adult education region that provide education and workforce services for adults.

(ii) The consortium has considered and responded to any comments submitted by entities pursuant to clause (i).

(iii) For purposes of this subparagraph, entities that provide education and workforce services to adults include, but are not necessarily limited to, local public agencies, departments, and offices, particularly those with responsibility for local public safety and social services; workforce investment boards; libraries; and community-based organizations.

(E) A decision is final.

(2) For purposes of this subdivision, a decision includes approval of an adult education plan pursuant to Section 84906 and approval of a distribution schedule pursuant to Section 84913.

(e) The members of the consortium may decide to designate a member to serve as the fund administrator to receive and distribute funds from the program.

84906.

(a) As a condition of receipt of an apportionment of funds from this program for a fiscal year, the members of a consortium shall have approved an adult education plan that addresses that fiscal year.

(b) An adult education plan shall include all of the following:

(1) An evaluation of the educational needs of adults in the region.

(2) A list of the following:

(A) Entities that provide education and workforce services to adults in the region.

(B) Entities that are impacted by, or that have a fundamental interest in, the provision of those services.

(3) A description of the services provided by entities listed pursuant to paragraph (2).

(4) An evaluation of current levels and types of education and workforce services for adults in the region.

(5) An evaluation of the funds available to the members of the consortium and the entities listed pursuant to paragraph (2), including funds other than those apportioned pursuant to this article.

(6) Actions that the members of the consortium will take to address the educational needs identified pursuant to paragraph (1).

(7) Actions that the members of the consortium will take to improve the effectiveness of their services.

(8) Actions that the members of the consortium, the entities listed pursuant to paragraph (2), and other interested parties will take to improve integration of services and to improve transitions into postsecondary education and the workforce, including actions related to all of the following:

(A) Placement of adults seeking education and workforce services into adult education programs.

(B) Alignment of academic standards and curricula for programs across entities that provide education and workforce services to adults.

(C) Qualifications of instructors, including common standards across entities that provide education and workforce services to adults.

(D) Collection and availability of data.

(9) A description of the alignment of adult education services supported by this program with those described in other education and workforce plans guiding services in the region, including plans pertaining to the building of career pathways and the employment of workforce sector strategies and those required pursuant to the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (Public Law 113-128).

(10) A description of the ways in which each of the entities identified in paragraph (2) contributed to the development of the plan.

(c) The members of a consortium shall approve an adult education plan at least once every three years. The plan shall be updated at least once each year based on available data.

(d) For the 2015–16, 2016–17, and 2017–18 fiscal years, a regional plan developed pursuant to Section 84830 shall satisfy the requirements of this section.

84907.

No later than July 31, 2015, the chancellor and the Superintendent, with the advice of the executive director, shall certify, for each school district and county office of education, the amount of state funds required to be expended for adult education pursuant to paragraph (7) of subdivision (a) of Section 42238.03, and paragraph (3) of subdivision (k) of Section 2575, respectively.

84908.

(a) If the total amount certified for all school districts and county offices of education pursuant to Section 84907 is less than three hundred seventy-five million dollars (\$375,000,000), the chancellor and the Superintendent shall do both of the following:

(1) Apportion funds appropriated for the program in the Budget Act of 2015, no later than August
 30, 2015, to each school district or county office of education in an amount equal to the amount

certified for that school district or county office of education pursuant to Section 84907. As a condition of receipt of an apportionment, a school district or county office of education is required to be a member of a consortium.

(2) (A) (i) With the concurrence of the executive director, approve a schedule of allocations to each consortium, no later than October 30, 2015, of any funds appropriated for the program in the Budget Act of 2015 that remain after funds have been apportioned pursuant to paragraph (1).

(ii) The chancellor and the Superintendent shall determine the amount to be allocated to each consortium pursuant to this paragraph based on that adult education region's share of the statewide need for adult education.

(B) Using the schedule approved pursuant to subparagraph (A), the chancellor and the Superintendent shall do one of the following for each consortium:

(i) Apportion funds to a fund administrator designated by the members of a consortium beginning no more than 30 days after approval of the schedule pursuant to subparagraph (A).

(ii) Apportion funds to members of a consortium beginning no more than 30 days after receipt of a final distribution schedule from that consortium.

(b) If the total amount certified for all school districts and county offices of education pursuant to Section 84907 equals or exceeds three hundred seventy-five million dollars (\$375,000,000), the chancellor and the Superintendent shall do both of the following:

(1) Apportion funds appropriated for the program in the Budget Act of 2015, no later than August 30, 2015, to each school district or county office of education in an amount equal to the amount certified for that school district or county office of education pursuant to Section 84907 multiplied by three hundred seventy-five million dollars (\$375,000,000), divided by the total amount certified for all school districts and county offices of education pursuant to Section 84907.

(2) (A) (i) With the concurrence of the executive director, approve a schedule of allocations to each consortium, no later than October 30, 2015, of any funds appropriated for this program in the Budget Act of 2015 that remain after funds have been apportioned pursuant to paragraph (1).

(ii) The chancellor and the Superintendent shall determine the amount to be allocated to each consortium pursuant to this paragraph based on that adult education region's share of the statewide need for adult education.

(B) Using the schedule approved pursuant to subparagraph (A), the chancellor and the Superintendent shall do one of the following for each consortium:

(i) Apportion funds to a fund administrator designated by the members of a consortium beginning no more than 30 days after approval of the schedule pursuant to subparagraph (A).

(ii) Apportion funds to members of a consortium beginning no more than 30 days after receipt of a final distribution schedule from that consortium.

(c) This section shall become inoperative on July 1, 2016, and, as of January 1, 2017, is repealed, unless a later enacted statute, that becomes operative on or before January 1, 2017, deletes or extends the dates on which it becomes inoperative and is repealed.

84909.

(a) This section shall apply commencing with the 2016–17 fiscal year.

(b) The chancellor and the Superintendent, with the advice of the executive director, shall approve, no later than February 28 of the prior fiscal year, a preliminary schedule of allocations to each consortium of any funds proposed in the Governor's Budget for the program.

(c) The chancellor and the Superintendent, with the advice of the executive director, shall approve, within 15 days of enactment of the annual Budget Act, a final schedule of allocations to each consortium of any funds appropriated by the Legislature for the program.

(d) The chancellor and the Superintendent shall determine the amount to be allocated to each consortium based on the following:

(1) The amount of funds apportioned to the members of that consortium in the immediately preceding fiscal year.

(2) That adult education region's share of the statewide need for adult education.

(3) That consortium's effectiveness in meeting the educational needs of adults in the adult education region based on available data.

(e) Using the final schedule approved pursuant to subdivision (c), the chancellor and the Superintendent shall do one of the following for each consortium:

(1) Apportion funds to a fund administrator designated by the members of a consortium beginning no more than 30 days after approval of the final schedule of allocations.

(2) Apportion funds to members of a consortium beginning no more than 30 days after receipt of a final distribution schedule from that consortium.

84910.

The chancellor and the Superintendent shall, when approving a schedule of allocations for a fiscal year, also present preliminary projections for the amounts that would be allocated in the subsequent two fiscal years. This preliminary presentation shall not constitute a binding commitment of funds.

84911.

To determine the need for adult education, the chancellor and the Superintendent shall consider, at a minimum, measures related to adult population, employment, immigration, educational attainment, and adult literacy.

84912.

The chancellor and the Superintendent shall apportion funds appropriated for the program in a given year in compliance with all of the following:

(a) No more than one-twelfth of the total amount appropriated shall have been apportioned by the end of July.

(b) No more than one-sixth of the total amount appropriated shall have been apportioned by the end of August.

(c) No more than one-quarter of the total amount appropriated shall have been apportioned by the end of September.

(d) No more than one-third of the total amount appropriated shall have been apportioned by the end of October.

(e) No more than five-twelfths of the total amount appropriated shall have been apportioned by the end of November.

(f) No more than one-half of the total amount appropriated shall have been apportioned by the end of December.

(g) No more than seven-twelfths of the total amount appropriated shall have been apportioned by the end of January.

(h) No more than two-thirds of the total amount appropriated shall have been apportioned by the end of February.

(i) No more than three-quarters of the total amount appropriated shall have been apportioned by the end of March.

(j) No more than five-sixths of the total amount appropriated shall have been apportioned by the end of April.

(k) No more than eleven-twelfths of the total amount appropriated shall have been apportioned by the end of May.

84913.

(a) Funds apportioned for the program shall be used only for support of the following:

(1) Programs in elementary and secondary basic skills, including programs leading to a high school diploma or high school equivalency certificate.

(2) Programs for immigrants eligible for educational services in citizenship, English as a second language, and workforce preparation.

(3) Programs for adults, including, but not limited to, older adults, that are primarily related to entry or reentry into the workforce.

(4) Programs for adults, including, but not limited to, older adults, that are primarily designed to develop knowledge and skills to assist elementary and secondary school children to succeed academically in school.

(5) Programs for adults with disabilities.

(6) Programs in career technical education that are short term in nature and have high employment potential.

(7) Programs offering preapprenticeship training activities conducted in coordination with one or more apprenticeship programs approved by the Division of Apprenticeship Standards for the occupation and geographic area.

(b) A consortium may use no more than 5 percent of funds allocated in a given fiscal year for the sum of the following:

(1) The costs of administration of these programs.

(2) The costs of the consortium.

84914.

(a) As a condition of receipt of an apportionment from the program, a consortium shall approve a distribution schedule that includes both of the following:

(1) The amount of funds to be distributed to each member of the consortium for that fiscal year.

(2) A narrative justifying how the planned allocations are consistent with the adult education plan.

(b) (1) For any fiscal year for which the chancellor and the Superintendent allocate an amount of funds to the consortium greater than the amount allocated in the prior fiscal year, the amount of funds to be distributed to a member of that consortium shall be equal to or greater than the amount distributed in the prior fiscal year, unless the consortium makes at least one of the following findings related to the member for which the distribution would be reduced:

(A) The member no longer wishes to provide services consistent with the adult education plan.

(B) The member cannot provide services that address the needs identified in the adult education plan.

(C) The member has been consistently ineffective in providing services that address the needs identified in the adult education plan and reasonable interventions have not resulted in improvements.

(2) For any year for which the chancellor and the Superintendent allocate an amount of funds to the consortium less than the amount allocated in the prior year, the amount of funds to be distributed to a member of that consortium shall not be reduced by a percentage greater than the percentage by which the total amount of funds allocated to the consortium decreased, unless the consortium makes at least one of the following findings related to the member for which the distribution would be reduced further:

(A) The member no longer wishes to provide services consistent with the adult education plan.

(B) The member cannot provide services that address the needs identified in the adult education plan.

(C) The member has been ineffective in providing services that address the needs identified in the adult education plan and reasonable interventions have not resulted in improvements.

(c) A distribution schedule shall also include preliminary projections of the amount of funds that would be distributed to each member of the consortium in each of the subsequent two fiscal years. The preliminary projections shall not constitute a binding commitment of funds.

84915.

(a) It is the intent of the Legislature to coordinate programs that support education and workforce services for adults.

(b) No later than January 31, 2016, the chancellor and the Superintendent shall submit to the Director of Finance, to the State Board of Education, and, in conformity with Section 9795 of the Government Code, to the Legislature a plan approved by the chancellor and the Superintendent to distribute funds from the following programs to the consortia:

(1) (A) The federal Adult Education and Family Literacy Act (Title II of the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act).

(B) The plan for allocating funds under this paragraph shall comply with the criteria enumerated in subsection (e) of Section 3321 of Title 29 of the United States Code related to base disbursement of these funds.

(2) The federal Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education Act (Public Law 109-270).

84916.

In order to maximize the benefits derived from public funds provided for the purpose of addressing the educational needs of adults and to ensure the efficient and coordinated use of resources, it is the intent and expectation of the Legislature that any community college district,

school district, or county office of education, or any joint powers authority consisting of community college districts, school districts, county offices of education, or a combination of these, located within the boundaries of the adult education region shall be a member of a consortium pursuant to this article if it receives funds from any of the following programs or allocations:

(a) The Adults in Correctional Facilities program.

(b) The federal Adult Education and Family Literacy Act (Title II of the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act).

(c) The federal Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education Act (Public Law 109-270).

(d) Local Control Funding Formula apportionments received for students who are 19 years of age or older.

(e) Community college apportionments received for providing instruction in courses in the areas listed in subdivision (a) of Section 84913.

(f) State funds for remedial education and job training services for participants in the CalWORKs program.

84917.

(a) To inform actions taken by the Governor and the Legislature related to adult education, the chancellor and the Superintendent shall submit to the Director of Finance, to the State Board of Education, and, in conformity with Section 9795 of the Government Code, to the Legislature, by September 30 following any fiscal year for which funds are appropriated for the program, a report about the use of these funds and outcomes for adults statewide and in each adult education region. The report shall include at least all of the following:

(1) A summary of the adult education plan operative for each consortium.

(2) The distribution schedule for each consortium.

(3) The types and levels of services provided by each consortium.

(4) The effectiveness of each consortium in meeting the educational needs of adults in its respective region.

(5) Any recommendations related to delivery of education and workforce services for adults, including recommendations related to improved alignment of state programs.

(b) (1) The chancellor and the Superintendent may require a consortium, as a condition of receipt of an apportionment, to submit any reports or data necessary to produce the report described in subdivision (a).

(2) The chancellor and the Superintendent shall align the data used to produce the report described in subdivision (a) with data reported by local educational agencies for other purposes, such as data used for purposes of the federal Workforce Opportunity and Innovation Act (Public Law 113-128).

(3) The Employment Development Department and the California Workforce Investment Board shall provide any assistance needed to align delivery of services across state and regional workforce, education, and job service programs.

SEC. 40.

Section 84920 is added to the Education Code, to read:

84920.

(a) To the extent that one-time funding is made available in the Budget Act of 2015, consistent with the provisions of Section 84917, the chancellor and the Superintendent shall identify common measures for determining the effectiveness of members of each consortium in meeting the educational needs of adults. At a minimum, the chancellor and the Superintendent shall accomplish both of the following:

(1) Define the specific data each consortium shall collect.

(2) Establish a menu of common assessments and policies regarding placement of adults seeking education and workforce services into adult education programs to be used by each consortium to measure educational needs of adults and the effectiveness of providers in addressing those needs.

(b) It is the intent of the Legislature that both of the following occur:

(1) That the educational needs of adults in the state be better identified and understood through better sharing of data across state agencies.

(2) That, at a minimum, the chancellor and the Superintendent shall enter into agreements to share data related to effectiveness of the consortia between their agencies and with other state agencies, including, but not necessarily limited to, the Employment Development Department and the California Workforce Investment Board.

(c) The chancellor and the Superintendent shall identify, no later than January 1, 2016, the measures for assessing the effectiveness of consortia that will be used in the report that, pursuant to Section 84917, is to be submitted by September 30, 2016. These measures shall include, but not necessarily be limited to, all of the following:

(1) How many adults are served by members of the consortium?

(2) How many adults served by members of the consortium have demonstrated the following:

(A) Improved literacy skills.

- (B) Completion of high school diplomas or their recognized equivalents.
- (C) Completion of postsecondary certificates, degrees, or training programs.
- (D) Placement into jobs.
- (E) Improved wages.

(d) No later than November 1, 2015, the chancellor and the Superintendent shall submit to the Director of Finance, the state board, and the appropriate policy and fiscal committees in the Legislature a report of its progress in meeting the requirements of subdivisions (a) and (b).

(e) The chancellor and the Superintendent shall apportion the funds appropriated for purposes of this section in the Budget Act of 2015 in accordance with both of the following:

(1) Eighty-five percent of these funds shall be used for grants to consortia to establish systems or obtain data necessary to submit any reports or data required pursuant to subdivision (b) of Section 84917.

(2) Fifteen percent of these funds shall be used for grants for development of statewide policies and procedures related to data collection or reporting or for technical assistance to consortia, or both.

(f) The chancellor and the Superintendent shall provide any guidance to the consortia necessary to support the sharing of data included in systems established by consortia pursuant to this section across consortia.

EDUCATION FOR ENGLISH LANGUAGE LEARNERS

The Governing Board intends to provide English language learners with challenging curriculum and instruction that develops proficiency in English as effectively and efficiently as possible in order to assist students in accessing the full educational program and achieving the district's academic standards. The district's program shall be based on sound educational theory and shall be adequately supported so that English language learners can achieve results at the same academic level as their English-proficient peers in the regular course of study.

The district shall identify in its local control and accountability plan (LCAP) specific actions and services to enhance student engagement, academic achievement, and other outcomes for English learners.

The Board encourages staff to exchange information with other districts and the County Office of Education about programs, options, and strategies for English language learners that succeed under various demographic conditions.

English learners shall be provided English language development instruction targeted to their English proficiency level and aligned with the state content standards and curriculum framework. The district's program shall be based on sound instructional theory, use standards-aligned instructional materials, and assist students in accessing the full educational program.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all staff employed to teach English learners possess the appropriate authorization from the Commission on Teacher Credentialing.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide to teachers, administrators, and other school staff researchbased professional development that is designed to improve the instruction and assessment of English learners and enhance staff's ability to understand and use curricula, assessment, and instructional strategies for English learners.

Identification and Assessment

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain procedures which provide for the accurate identification of English learners and an assessment of their proficiency and needs in the areas of listening, speaking, reading, and writing in English. Once identified as an English learner, a student shall be annually assessed for language proficiency until he/she is reclassified based on criteria specified in the accompanying administrative regulation.

English learners' academic achievement in English language arts, mathematics, science, and any additional subject required by law shall be assessed using the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress. As necessary, the test shall be administered with allowable testing variations in accordance with 5 CCR 853.5 and 853.7. English learners who are in their first 12 months of attending a school in the United States shall be exempted from taking the English language arts assessment to the extent allowed by federal law.

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain procedures which provide for the identification, assessment and placement of English language learners and for their re-designation based on criteria adopted by the Board and specified in administrative regulations.

To evaluate program effectiveness, the Superintendent or designee shall regularly examine program results, including reports of the English language learners' academic achievement, their progress towards proficiency in English and the progress of students who have been re-designated as fluent English proficient as delineated in the San Dieguito Union High School District Master Plan for English Learners. The Superintendent or designee shall annually report these findings to the Board and shall also provide the Board with regular reports from any district or school wide English learner advisory committees.

TYPE OF INSTRUCTION

Students who are English language learners shall be educated through "sheltered English Immersion" not normally intended to exceed one year. "Nearly all" of the classroom instruction in the district's sheltered English immersion program shall be in English, but with curriculum and presentation designed for students who are learning the language (Education Code 305, 306)

The district has defined the term "nearly all" as follows:

"Nearly all" as it pertains to the use of English in the sheltered immersion program is a minimum of seventy percent of the instructional day must be in English.

When an English language learner has acquired a reasonable level of English proficiency as measured by the California English Language Development Test (CELDT) he/she shall be transferred from a structured English immersion classroom to an English language mainstream classroom in accordance with the district master plan for English language learners. Instruction in the English language mainstream program is "overwhelmingly" in English. (Education Code 305; 5 CCR 11301)

An English language learner has acquired a "reasonable level of English proficiency" when he/she has achieved the following:

"Reasonable level of English proficiency" as it pertains to English language learners in the San Dieguito Union High School District is a California English Language Development Test (CELDT) overall proficiency

level of Early Advanced and no lower than Intermediate in any one CELDT sub-test.

Upon request of her/his parent/guardian, a student shall be placed in an English language mainstream classroom. (5 CCR 11301)

PARENTAL EXCEPTION WAIVERS

At any time during the school year, the parent/guardian of an English language learner may have her/his child moved into an English language mainstream program. Parent/guardian requests for waivers from Education Code 305 regarding placement from a sheltered immersion program to placement in an alternative program shall be granted in accordance with the law and administrative regulation.

If the Superintendent or designee denies the waiver request, she/he shall provide a written justification to the parent/guardian describing the reasons for the denial. A parent/guardian may appeal the Superintendent's decision in writing to the Board. The Board may consider the matter at its next regular Board meeting. If the Board hears the appeal, the Superintendent shall send the Board's decision to the parent/guardian within seven working days.

PROGRAM EVALUATION

To evaluate the effectiveness of the district's educational program for English learners, the Superintendent or designee shall report to the Board, at least annually, regarding:

- 1. Progress of English learners towards proficiency in English
- 2. The number and percentage of English learners reclassified as fluent English proficient

3. The number and percentage of English learners who are or are at risk of being classified as long-term English learners in accordance with Education Code 313.1

- 4. The achievement of English learners on standards-based tests in core curricular areas
- 5. Progress toward any other goals for English learners identified in the district's LCAP
- 6. A comparison of current data with data from at least the previous year.

The Superintendent or designee also shall provide the Board with regular reports from any district or schoolwide English learner advisory committees.

STUDENT ORGANIZATIONS AND EQUAL ACCESS

Student organizations have an important place in the educational program. When properly organized and operated, they:

- 1. Extend and reinforce the instructional program.
- 2. Give students practice in democratic self-government.
- 3. Build student morale and positive support for the school.
- 4. Honor outstanding student achievement.
- 5. Provide wholesome social and recreational activities.

School-sponsored organizations must be organized at the school, sponsored by school personnel, composed completely of current student body members, hold the majority of their meetings at school and have a democratic plan for the selection of members. Organizational activities shall not conflict with the authority and responsibilities of school officials.

LIMITED OPEN FORUM

District high schools-(San Dieguito Academy, Torrey Pines, La Costa Canyon and Sunset High Schools)-shall maintain a limited open forum during which students may hold meetings or activities not directly related to the school curriculum. The principal shall schedule this forum on non-instructional time so that it in no way interferes with regular school activities.

The Board shall not deny access to any student-initiated group on the basis of religious, political, philosophical or any other content to be addressed at such meetings.

The Superintendent or designee shall insure that meetings held within the limited open forum are voluntary and student-initiated, with no direction, control, or regular attendance by non-school persons.

School staff shall not promote or participate in these meetings, but may be assigned to simply observe them, provided that the meeting does not conflict with the staff member's beliefs.

Meetings held within the limited open forum shall entail no expenditure of public funds beyond the incidental cost of providing the meeting space. Any announcement of meetings shall clearly state that the group is not sponsored by the school or school staff.

Authorization of use under the federal Equal Access Act does not indicate that the Board approves or advocates matters which are discussed at open forum meetings. Furthermore, religious groups granted access pursuant to the Equal Access Act are granted access only pursuant to that Act. Such access does not constitute district sanction of any particular religious belief.

STUDENT ORGANIZATIONS

The superintendent shall prepare administrative regulations to implement a limited open forum at the district's high schools.

HAZING

No student shall conspire to engage in hazing, participate in hazing, or commit any act that causes or is likely to cause bodily danger, physical harm, or personal degradation or disgrace resulting in physical or mental harm to any fellow student or other person. Persons violating this policy shall be subject to district discipline, misdemeanor penalties, and forfeiture of entitlements.

Membership in secret fraternities, sororities, and clubs is prohibited.

JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL SPORTS PROGRAM

OPPORTUNITY PROGRAM

The San Dieguito Union High School District Board of Trustees recognizes that alternative programs are needed for certain pupils enrolled in grades 7-9. These pupils demonstrate the following behavior(s):

Insubordinate or disorderly conduct as documented by teacher observations and administrative records of disciplinary referrals.

Increasingly irregular attendance as documented by attendance records.

Truant or habitually truant behaviors as defined by Education Code 48260 or 48262.

The superintendent is authorized to develop administrative regulations to be followed in the establishment and maintenance of such a program.

GIFTED AND TALENTED STUDENT PROGRAM

The Governing Board believes that all students deserve an education that matches their abilities. The district shall participate in the California Gifted and Talented Pupil Program in order to give gifted and talented students opportunities to acquire skills and understanding at levels commensurate with their potential. By cultivating their exceptional abilities or talents, these students may contribute significantly-to our society's progress in diverse fields.

Gifted and talented programs may offer special day classes; part-time grouping; enrichment activities; cluster grouping; independent study; acceleration; postsecondary education opportunities; services forunderachieving, linguistically or culturally divergent and/or economically disadvantaged eligiblestudents; and special counseling or instruction not offered in the regular classroom.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish procedures which ensure parent/guardian participationin planning, evaluating and implementing the program.

The Board shall conduct an annual assessment of the gifted and talented program.

STUDENT AND FAMILY PRIVACY RIGHTS

The Governing Board respects the rights of district students and their parents/guardians with regard to the privacy of their personal beliefs and the confidentiality of their personal information. The Superintendent or designee shall develop regulations to ensure compliance with law when the district requests, retains, discloses, or otherwise uses the personal information of its students and their families.

The regulations shall, at a minimum, address the following: (20 USC 1232h)

- 1. Whether the district may collect the personal information of students for marketing or sale
- 2. How the district will administer surveys that may request information about the personal beliefs and practices of students and their families
- 3. The rights of parents/guardians to inspect:
 - a. Survey instruments requesting information about their personal beliefs and practices or those of their children
 - b. Instructional materials used as part of their children's educational curriculum
- 4. Whether the district may administer any nonemergency invasive physical examination or screening
- 5. Notifications that the district will provide to students and parents/guardians with respect to their privacy rights

The Superintendent or designee shall consult with parents/guardians regarding the development of the procedures. (20 USC 1232h).

The meetings shall not materially and substantially interfere with the orderly conduct of educational activities within the school. The Board shall not deny access to any student initiated group on the basis of religious, political, philosophical or any other content to be addressed at such meetings.

The Superintendent or designee shall insure that meetings held within the limited open forum are voluntary and student initiated, with no direction, control, or regular attendance by non-school persons.

There shall be no sponsorship of limited open forum meetings by the school or staff. The term sponsorship means that school staff are promoting, leading, or participating in a meeting. The assignment of a teacher, administrator, or other school employee to a meeting for custodial purposes shall not constitute sponsorship of the meeting. Employees of the school shall be present at religious meetings only in a nonparticipatory capacity.

Meetings held within the limited open forum shall entail no expenditure of public funds beyond the incidental cost of providing the meeting space. All student clubs or groups shall have equal access to the school media to announce meetings, including the public address system, the school newspaper, bulletin boards, and school web site. However, the principal or designee may issue a disclaimer that such activities are not school sponsored

Authorization of use under the federal Equal Access Act does not indicate that the Board approves or advocates matters which are discussed at open forum meetings. Furthermore, religious groups granted access pursuant to the Equal Access Act are granted access only pursuant to that Act. Such access does not constitute district sanction of any particular religious belief.

PARENTAL NOTIFICATIONS

The Governing Board recognizes that notifications are essential to effective communication between the school and the home. The Superintendent or designee shall send students and parents/guardians all notifications required by law, including notifications about their legal rights, and any other notifications he/she believes will promote parental understanding and involvement.

The notice required pursuant to Education Code 48980 shall be sent at the beginning of each academic year and may be provided either by regular mail, in electronic form when so requested by the parent/guardian, or by any other method normally used to communicate with parents/guardians in writing. (Education Code 48981, 48982)

If any activity specified in Education Code 48980 will be undertaken by any school during the forthcoming school term, the notice shall state that fact and the approximate date on which any such activity will occur. No such activity shall be undertaken with respect to any particular student unless his/her parent/guardian has been informed of such action through the annual notification or other separate special notification. (Education Code 48983-48984)

The annual notification shall include a request that the parent/guardian sign the notice and return it to the school or, if the notice is provided in electronic format, that the parent/guardian submit a signed acknowledgment of receipt of the notice to the school. The parent/guardian's signature is an acknowledgment of receipt of the information but does not indicate that consent to participate in any particular program has been given or withheld. (Education Code 48982)

Notifications to parents/guardians shall be written both in English and in the family's primary language when so required by law. (Education Code 48981, 48985; 20 USC 6311, 6312)

Whenever an employee learns that a student's parent/guardian is, for any reason, unable to understand the district's printed notifications, the principal or designee shall work with the parent/guardian to establish other appropriate means of communication.

TOBACCO

The Governing Board recognizes the serious health risks presented by tobacco use and desires to ensure that, through adoption of consistent policies, district students are made aware of those risks and, to the extent possible, protected from them. The Superintendent or designee shall establish a coordinated school health system which includes a comprehensive behavioral health education component that teaches students the knowledge, skills, and attitudes they need in order to lead healthy lives and avoid high-risk behaviors, such as tobacco use.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide prevention, intervention, and cessation education, information, activities, and/or referrals to district students and shall ensure consistent enforcement of district policies prohibiting student possession and use of tobacco products.

Prohibition Against Tobacco Use

Students shall not possess, smoke, or use tobacco or any product containing tobacco or nicotine while on campus, while attending school-sponsored activities, or while under the supervision and control of district employees. Prohibited products include, but are not limited to, cigarettes, cigars, miniature cigars, clove cigarettes, smokeless tobacco, snuff, chew packets, and betel. (Education Code 48900, 48901)

Students' possession or use of electronic cigarettes, electronic hookahs, and other vapor-emitting devices, with or without nicotine content, that mimic the use of tobacco products is also prohibited.

These prohibitions do not apply to a student's possession or use of his/her own prescription products. However, student possession or use of prescription products in school shall be subject to the district's policy and regulation for addressing the administration of medications on campus. (Education Code 48900)

Prevention Instruction

The district shall provide developmentally appropriate tobacco-use prevention instruction for students at selected grade levels from K-12 pursuant to Education Code 51202. Such instruction shall be aligned with state content standards and the state curriculum framework for health education and with any requirements of state and/or federal grant programs in which the district participates.

Intervention/Cessation Services

The district may provide or refer students to counseling, intensive education, and other intervention services to assist in the cessation of tobacco use. Such intervention services shall be provided as an alternative to suspension for tobacco possession.

Program Planning

The district's tobacco-use prevention and intervention program shall be based on an assessment of tobacco-use problems in district schools and the community, an examination of existing services and activities in the community, and a determination of high-risk student populations that are most in need of district services.

The Superintendent or designee shall coordinate with the local health department and county office of education in program planning and implementation. He/she may establish an advisory council including students, parents/guardians, district staff, representatives of the local health department and community organizations, law enforcement professionals, and/or others with demonstrated expertise in tobacco prevention and cessation.

The Superintendent or designee also shall coordinate the district's tobacco-use prevention and intervention program with other district efforts to reduce students' use of illegal substances and to promote student wellness.

The Superintendent or designee shall select tobacco-use prevention programs based on the model program designs identified by the California Department of Education (CDE) and may adapt the model to meet district needs. (Health and Safety Code 104420)

The Superintendent or designee shall not accept for distribution any materials or advertisements that promote the use or sale of tobacco products. He/she also shall not accept tobacco-use prevention or intervention funds or materials from the tobacco industry or from any entity which is known to have received funding from the tobacco industry.

Program Evaluation

To evaluate the effectiveness of the district's program and ensure accountability, the Superintendent or designee shall biennially administer the California Healthy Kids Survey or other appropriate student survey at selected grade levels in order to assess student attitudes toward tobacco and student use of tobacco. He/she also shall annually report to the Board, and to the CDE if required, the data specified in Health and Safety Code 104450.

The results of program evaluations shall be used to refine program goals and objectives and make changes as needed to strengthen program implementation.

NONDISCRIMINATION IN EMPLOYMENT DISTRICT PROGRAMS AND ACTIVITIES

Any district employee who engages in prohibited discrimination, harassment, or retaliation or who aids, abets, incites, compels, or coerces another to engage or attempt to engage in such behavior in violation of this policy shall be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including dismissal.

Any employee or job applicant who believes that he/she has been or is being discriminated against or harassed in violation of district policy should, as appropriate, immediately contact his/her supervisor, the Coordinator, or the Superintendent who shall advise the employee or applicant about the district's procedures for filing, investigating, and resolving any such complaint.

Complaints regarding employment discrimination or harassment shall immediately be investigated in accordance with AR 4031 - Complaints Concerning Discrimination in Employment.

Any supervisory or management employee who observes or has knowledge of an incident of prohibited discrimination or harassment shall report the incident to the Coordinator or Superintendent as soon as

practical after the incident. All other employees are encouraged to report such incidents to their supervisor immediately.

He/she shall take prompt, reasonable actions to remove any identified barrier. provide training to employees about how to recognize harassment and discrimination, how to respond appropriately, and components of the district's policies and regulations regarding discrimination.

The Superintendent or designee shall report his/her findings and recommendations to the Board after each review.

Pursuant to 34 CFR 104.8 and 34 CFR 106.9, the Superintendent or designee shall notify students, parents/guardians, employees, employee organizations, applicants for admission and employment, and sources of referral for applicants about the district's policy on nondiscrimination and related complaint procedures. policy and the availability of complaint procedures. Such notification publication shall be included in each announcement, bulletin, catalog, handbook, or application form, or other materials distributed to these groups. that is used in employee recruitment. (34 CFR 100.6, 106.9)

The district's nondiscrimination policy and related informational materials shall be published in a format that parents/guardians can understand. In addition, when 15 percent or more of a school's students speak a single primary language other than English, those materials shall be translated into that other language.

ACCESS FOR INDIVIDUALS WITH DISABILITIES

District programs and facilities, viewed in their entirety, shall be in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act and any implementing standards and/or regulations.

These aids and services may include, but are not limited to, qualified interpreters or readers, assistive listening devices, notetakers, written materials, taped text, and Braille or large print materials.

Individuals with disabilities shall notify the Superintendent or principal if they have a disability that requires special assistance or services. Reasonable notification should be given prior to the school-sponsored function, program, or meeting.

It shall be the policy of the San Dieguito Union High School District to-

STUDENT USE OF TECHNOLOGY

The Board of Trustees intends that technological resources provided by the district be used in a safe and responsible manner in support of the instructional program and for the advancement of student learning. All students using these resources shall receive instruction in their proper and appropriate use.

Teachers, administrators, and/or learning common technicians are expected to review the technological resources and online sites that will be used in the classroom or assigned to students in order to ensure that they are appropriate for the intended purpose and the age of the students.

The Superintendent or designee shall notify students and parents/guardians about authorized uses of district technology, user obligations and responsibilities, and consequences for unauthorized use and/or unlawful activities in accordance with this Board policy and the district's Acceptable Use Agreement.

District technology includes, but is not limited to, computers, the district's computer network including servers and wireless computer networking technology (wi-fi), the Internet, email, USB drives, wireless access points (routers), tablet computers, smartphones and smart devices, telephones, cellular telephones, personal digital assistants, pagers, MP3 players, wearable technology, any wireless communication device including emergency radios, and/or future technological innovations, whether accessed on or off site or through district-owned or personally owned equipment or devices.

Before a student is authorized to use district technology, the student and his/her parent/guardian shall sign and return the Acceptable Use Agreement. In that agreement, the parent/guardian shall agree not to hold the district or any district staff responsible for the failure of any technology protection measures or user mistakes or negligence and shall agree to indemnify and hold harmless the district and district staff for any damages or costs incurred.

Whenever a student is found to have violated Board policy or the district's Acceptable Use Agreement, the principal or designee may cancel or limit a student's user privileges or increase supervision of the student's use of the district's equipment and other technological resources, as appropriate. Inappropriate use also may result in disciplinary action and/or legal action in accordance with law and Board policy.

The Superintendent or designee, with input from students and appropriate staff, shall regularly review and update procedures to enhance the safety and security of students using district technology and to help ensure that the district adapts to changing technologies and circumstances.

Internet Safety

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all district computers with Internet access have a technology protection measure that protects against access to visual depictions that are obscene, child pornography, or harmful to minors and that the operation of such measures is enforced. (20 USC <u>6777</u>; 47 USC 254; 47 CFR <u>54.520</u>)

To reinforce these measures, the Superintendent or designee shall implement rules and procedures designed to restrict students' access to harmful or inappropriate matter on the Internet and to ensure that students do not engage in unauthorized or unlawful online activities.

Harmful matter includes matter, taken as a whole, which to the average person, applying contemporary statewide standards, appeals to the prurient interest and is matter which depicts or describes, in a patently offensive way, sexual conduct and which lacks serious literary, artistic, political, or scientific value for minors. (Penal Code <u>313</u>)

The district's Acceptable Use Agreement shall establish expectations for appropriate student conduct when using the Internet or other forms of electronic communication, including, but not limited to, prohibitions against:

1. Accessing, posting, submitting, publishing, or displaying harmful or inappropriate matter that is threatening, obscene, disruptive, or sexually explicit, or that could be construed as harassment or disparagement of others based on their race/ethnicity, national origin, sex, gender, sexual orientation, age, disability, religion, or political beliefs

2. Intentionally uploading, downloading, or creating computer viruses and/or maliciously attempting to harm or destroy district equipment or materials or manipulate the data of any other user, including so-called "hacking"

3. Distributing personal identification information, including the name, address, telephone number, Social Security number, or other personally identifiable information, of another student, staff member, or other person with the intent to threaten, intimidate, harass, or ridicule that person

The Superintendent or designee shall provide age-appropriate instruction regarding safe and appropriate behavior on social networking sites, chat rooms, and other Internet services. Such instruction shall include, but not be limited to, the dangers of posting one's own personal identification information online, misrepresentation by online predators, how to report inappropriate or offensive content or threats, behaviors that constitute cyberbullying, and how to respond when subjected to cyberbullying.

SCHOOL BUS CONDUCT / STUDENT SAFETY

BULLYING

Students

The Governing Board recognizes the harmful effects of bullying on student learning and school attendance and desires to provide safe school environments that protect students from physical and emotional harm. District employees shall establish student safety as a high priority and shall not tolerate bullying of any student.

No individual or group shall, through physical, written, verbal, or other means, harass, sexually harass, threaten, intimidate, retaliate, cyberbully, cause bodily injury to, or commit hate violence against any student or school <u>and</u>-personnel.

Cyberbullying includes the creation or transmission of harassing communications, direct threats, or other harmful texts, sounds, or images on the Internet, social media, or other technologies using a telephone, computer, or any wireless communication device. Cyberbullying also includes breaking into another person's electronic account and assuming that person's identity in order to damage that person's reputation.

Strategies for addressing bullying in district schools shall be developed with involvement of key stakeholders, including students, parents/guardians, and staff, and may be incorporated into the comprehensive safety plan, the local control and accountability plan, and other applicable district and school plans.

As appropriate, the Superintendent or designee may collaborate with law enforcement, courts, social services, mental health services, other agencies, and community organizations in the development and implementation of joint strategies to promote safety in schools and the community and to provide services for alleged victims and perpetrators of bullying.

BULLYING PREVENTION

To the extent possible, district schools shall focus on the prevention of bullying by establishing clear rules for student conduct and implementing strategies to promote a positive, collaborative school climate. Students shall be informed, through student handbooks and other appropriate means, of district and school rules related to bullying, mechanisms available for reporting incidents or threats, and the consequences for engaging in bullying.

As appropriate, the district shall provide students with instruction, in the classroom or other educational settings, that promotes effective communication and conflict resolution skills, social skills, character/values education, respect for cultural and individual differences, self-esteem development, assertiveness skills, and appropriate online behavior.

Staff shall receive related professional development, including information about early warning signs of harassing/intimidating behaviors and effective response.

Based on an assessment of bullying incidents at school, the Superintendent or designee may increase supervision and security in areas where bullying most often occurs, such as classrooms, playgrounds, hallways, restrooms, and cafeterias.

INTERVENTION

Students are encouraged to notify school staffThe driver is held responsible for the orderly conduct of the pupils and others when they are being bullied or suspect that another student is being victimized. In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall develop means for students to report threats or incidents confidentially and anonymously.

School staff who witness an act of bullying shall immediately intervene to stop the incident when it is safe to do so. (Education Code 234.1)

on District owned vehicles.

When appropriate based on the severity or pervasiveness of the bullying, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the parents/guardians of victims and perpetrators and may contact law enforcement.

The Superintendent, principal, or principal's designee may refer a victim, witness, perpetrator, or other student affected by an act of bullying to a school counselor, school psychologist, social worker, child welfare attendance personnel, school nurse, or other school support service personnel for case management, counseling, and/or participation in a restorative justice program as appropriate. (Education Code 48900.9)

REPORTING AND FILING OF COMPLAINTS

Any student, parent/guardian, or other individual who believes that a student has been subjected to bullying or who has witnessed bullying may report the incident to a teacher, the principal, assistant principal, a compliance officer, or any other available school employee. Within one business day of receiving such a report, a staff member shall notify the principal of the report, whether or not a uniform complaint is filed. In addition, any school employee who observes an incident of bullying involving a student shall, within one business day, report his/her observation to the principal or a district compliance officer, whether or not the alleged victim files a complaint.

Within two business days of receiving a report of bullying, the principal shall notify the district compliance officer identified in AR 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures.

When the circumstances involve cyberbullying, individuals with information about the activity shall be encouraged to save and print any electronic or digital messages that they feel constitute cyberbullying and to notify a teacher, the principal, assistant principal, or other employee so that the matter may be investigated. When a student uses a social networking site or service to bully or harass another student, the Superintendent or designee may file a request with the networking site or service to suspend theto insure the safety of all students, and shall include, but not be limited to, denial of riding privileges of the student and to have the material removed.

When a report of bullying is submitted, the principal or a district compliance officer shall inform the student or parent/guardian of the right to file a formal written complaint in accordance with AR 1312.3. The student who is the alleged victim of the bullying shall be given an opportunity to describe the incident,

identify witnesses who may have relevant information, and provide other evidence of bullying.

INVESTIGATION AND RESOLUTION OF COMPLAINTS

Any complaint of bullying shall be investigated and, if determined to be discriminatory, resolved in accordance with law and the district's uniform complaint procedures specified in AR 1312.3.

If, during the investigation, it is determined that a complaint is about nondiscriminatory bullying, the principal or designee shall inform the complainant and shall take all necessary actions to resolve the complaint.

DISCIPLINE

Corrective actions for a student who commits an act of bullying of any type may include counseling, behavioral intervention and education, and, if the behavior is severe or pervasive as defined in Education Code 48900, may include suspension or expulsion in accordance with district policies and regulations.

Any employee who permits or engages in bullying or retaliation related to bullying shall be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including dismissal.

Written rules and regulations regarding conduct on District owned vehicles shall be made available to all students, parents of students, and others who use the District's transportation facilities. Students and parents/guardians of students being transported by District owned vehicles will be required to read and sign the bus transportation rules of conduct form. Students will be required to adhere to the rules of conduct.
